# Queensland Globe: get hands-on with Queensland geography

Queensland Globe is an interactive mapping website providing access to the spatial information held by the Queensland Government. It is a powerful tool with an extensive array of information that can be overlaid on the maps, but it can be overwhelming for the beginner.

This hands-on session will be aimed beginners including: navigating around the Globe, searching for locations by a range of methods, obtaining information about a particular place, and working with the hundreds of built-in data layers (some of which will be included in the presentation).

Some of the limitations of the Queensland Globe will also be discussed. Note that Queensland Globe primarily deals with current information rather than historical information. However, there will be examples of how Queensland Globe can be used to help with your history research.





## **Book Review**



Much has been written on various aspects of World War 1. One might wonder if there is something "different". We can find it here in *The Silent Soldiers of Naours* by Gilles Prilaux et al. One might regard this work as the meeting of archaeology and genealogy via graffiti. The latter term can bring a shudder from those who see it as defacement but in this work it is the driving force.

The area round Naours, France, is a honeycomb warren of caves. Digging for protection began sometime round the time of the Norman conquest but in more recent days they lay forgotten until the late 1800's. A detailed map of the caves is reproduced in the book. It may be fairly assumed that while the battle raged in the Somme soldiers on their "day off" went into the caves leaving a personal graffiti. But what became of them after that? The specific interest with this work investigates the 50 Australian soldiers whose names are listed. This is not to say other nationalities were not there too but the team working on this project limited it to Australia. Two high schools were a part of the team – Kepnock State High in Bundaberg and Collège les Coudriers in the Naours area.

This is a fascinating read and certainly another facet of World War 1 history. The book outlines a biography for each soldier. Where possible there are

photographs of the men but there are also numerous well produced photos of the graffiti and the cave system. The work is well sourced and indexed in 210 pages.
