As you know, books in the print library have been for research purposes only, not for borrowing. We are making it easier for you. Some books are being re-catalogued and will be available from the QFHS Lending Library.

#### QFHS Books - Name Accumulation Index

This ever-growing index provides details about people mentioned in books now found in the Lending Library, particularly those that have been entered into the annual QFHS Book Award that dates from 1993; borrowing these books is available to financial members of the Society.

For each person listed in the index, the following are provided: (Personal) Title, if one

is provided; Year of publication; Page(s) on which the name is found; the title of the book (Source); Additional Fields, where additional information is provided by the book's author; and Call No.

Where "PDF" appears in the Call No. column, this is a link to the "Collection of Searchable Books" available on the QFHS website, from which the book of interest can be accessed. Note that the search facilities on the QFHS Books - Name Accumulation Index do not search PDF files for names of interest.

Queensland Globe is an interactive mapping website providing access to the spatial information held by the Queensland Government. It is a powerful tool with an extensive array of information that can be overlaid on the maps, but it can be overwhelming for the beginner.

This hands-on session will be aimed at beginners including: navigating around the Globe, searching for locations by a range of methods, obtaining information about a particular place, and working with the hundreds of built-in data layers (some of which will be included in the presentation).

Some of the limitations of the Qld Globe will also be discussed. Note that Queensland Globe primarily deals with current information rather than historical information.

## Registering for Zoom presentations

Just a friendly reminder that your email address is vital when you register for a Zoom presentation. Please double check that you have entered a correct and current email address.

We have had a couple of instances recently where people have missed sessions because they gave the incorrect email address. For instance, instead of an email address <name>@gmail.com, they have put <name>@gmail.com.au.

Often we need to change the Zoom link at the last minute, especially with free events, and if you do not supply a valid email address, you will miss out on any last minute notifications.

Immediately after registering for an event on Eventbrite, you should receive a confirmation email. If you do not receive this confirmation, it may be that the email address you gave was not valid. In fact, you should receive three emails generated by Eventbrite: one immediately after you register, a second two days before the event, and a third shortly before the event begins.
