The Australian Joint Copying Project in Trove: Using the digitised collections

The Australian Joint Copying Project (AJCP) is a collection of historical documents relating to Australia and other former British Colonies dating from 1560 to 1984. The material, which has now been microfilmed, comes from records held in the United Kingdom.

The microfilms in the collection are divided into two series:

Public Records Office (PRO) – records from the Public Record Office (now The National Archives)

Miscellaneous (M) – archives and manuscripts from a variety of English, Irish, Scottish, and Welsh institutions and organisations.

The AJCP (Australian Joint Copying Project) resources are now available through the Trove website and provide a wealth of material for family historians. In this session, Carmel will examine the scope and range of records available and investigate a variety of ways of finding treasures in this huge collection, and show you how you can access this rich collection.

The QFHS Library holds an almost complete range of the AJCP handbooks.

There is an excellent mix of Norfolk Island genealogy and history, DNA, Australasian and English information, from a wide variety of speakers who will appear in person.

Congress participants will also have time to explore the historic island, visit key venues and learn about its unique history. This is an opportunity to travel 'overseas' safely, while staying in Australia (for New Zealanders, it will be overseas within the Aus/NZ bubble.)





The latest QFHS publication, **Queensland School Pupils Index No 7,** is being prepared for upload to the website.

Watch the QFHS website for notice of its release and make sure your membership is up to date so you can search this dataset or include in your Global Keyword searches.

The index will include almost 1,152,000 names drawn from 407 schools and 401 sources created between 2002 and 2021. Dates covered range from 1866 to 2016. Where we have extracted the pupil names directly from admission registers, a 21 year closure has been observed as recommended by the Queensland State Archives. Schools range from large city ones, with admissions in the thousands, to country one-teacher schools with a total enrolment of hundreds. Some schools have long ceased to exist; others are still functioning.

Our latest upload to Searchable Datasets is a collection of 12,963 names of early residents in the Springsure District of Queensland. This is the work of member, Sue Harrod, who compiled the list whilst volunteering at the Springsure Information Centre and Museum and by answering queries from people searching for family. Includes Rolleston, Gindie and surrounding townships. Names were extracted from many booklets produced by local residents over many years.

Online Searching with QFHS

Have you been embracing the convenience and satisfaction of on-line searching over the last 12 months? QFHS volunteers have been working hard to expand your access to a significant range of records and we hope you're taking advantage of our searchable collections.

If you haven't already do take a look at the following recent additions.

QFHS Searchable Collections - Books. The digital books in this collection are ones considered of interest to those researching or writing about their families. The copyright holder for each has provided QFHS with the authority to make them publicly available on the QFHS website. This collection will be expanded as appropriate books come to hand. Most titles are available to the general public but you will need to login to view others. These books are fully searchable. To search one of these books, simply hold Ctrl + F and type in a name. Click here

Name Accumulation Index.

Each year the Queensland Family History Society presents an Award for the best history of a Queensland family published in book form within the last five years. This master index is compiled from books that have been entered in that competition since the competition commenced in 1993. They contain stories of families from all walks of life and all corners of our great state of Queensland.

We recently added a further 18,270 names to the QFHS Books – Accumulation Name Index. That brings the total to 70,965. So, even if you have already searched the index, it could be worthwhile repeating the exercise. It might just be the link you have been searching for. Remember no log-in is required to search.

A bonus for members is that all Award books have been re-catalogued and are now available to borrow from the Lending Library. There are some wonderful stories in these books of early settlers and how they coped with such a harsh environment. If you enjoy reading non-fiction with a family history theme you will enjoy these books.

Our next project with be books from the H6 shelves of the print library. The

classification is for individual and family histories and biographies. At this stage you will not be able to borrow these books and will need to travel to the Library and Resource Centre to research.

They reveal essential details like addresses, baptism and birth dates and parents' names.

Privacy rules have allowed Findmypast to expand this Welsh collection with baptisms from 1921 and marriages from 1936.

Each record comprises a transcript and black and white image of the original register. The amount of information listed may vary but, along with essential dates and locations, most records will enable you to discover the names of your ancestor's parents and spouse.

New Scotland Roman Catholic Parish Registers

646,933 new Scottish baptism, marriage, burial and congregational registers have been added to Findmypast's exclusive Catholic Heritage Archive.

Only available to search on Findmypast, the majority of these records cover the

Rare Resource - 1700s Flax Growers' List

AKA the Spinning Wheel Survey

Did you know you could trace your Irish ancestors back to the 18th century by way of the Flax Growers List? In the late 1700s an ambitious scheme by the Irish Linen Board to encourage flax farming supplied spinning wheels to more than 60,000 individuals, all over the island of Ireland.

From this was grown a vibrant linen industry, and the tradition of high-quality Irish linen is still alive and well today. Perhaps one of your ancestors received a spinning wheel or even a loom?
