Townsville Catholic Archive: History and family history resources in the collection



In this session, we will explore:


- why we should cite our sources for our family history

- citation formats (inline vs general), citation styles.

Findmypast offers 20% off subscriptions during Family History Month.

This August marks Family History Month, and family history website and event sponsors, Findmypast, are giving 20% off all subscriptions with the code FHM22 to mark the occasion.

Over half of Australians claim British and Irish heritage, and Findmypast acknowledges and respects the harm done to indigenous communities as a result of British colonisation. If you're interested in discovering British or Irish heritage, you'll find your family stories are at your fingertips in Findmypast's collection of over 3 million records and an ever-expanding historical newspaper collection.

The code FHM22 expires on 31 August and can be redeemed against any subscription on Findmypast.com.au.



Researching Passenger Lists

Many Irish family histories start with the arrival of an immigrant on foreign soil in the 19th century. Passenger list archives can give vital clues as to where people hailed from in Ireland and also about who they were travelling with or who they were travelling to.

IrelandXO are revisiting their guide to researching passenger lists, compiled by their volunteer partners at the Tower Museum which offers vital clues to anyone researching these lists. IrelandXO volunteer Jane Halloran Ryan also gives a video tutorial aimed at anyone interested in family history research. You can read more here.
