2023 - AUGUST IS NATIONAL FAMILY HISTORY MONTH

Theme: Secrets and Lies - Using AI responsibly and handling sensitive subjects in your family history research.


A series of talks, workshops, seminars, and information sessions – many of them free - will be held throughout Australia and New Zealand during August in celebration of National Family History Month.

Having grown from just one week of activities in 2006, National Family History Month now encompasses virtual and in-person activities covering lessons on how to write your family history, research guidance on British surnames, convict, Chinese, and Irish research lessons, visits to archives, and author talks.

Family history societies, libraries, and archives – often closed to the general public – will throw open their doors and offer education, research, and training opportunities for both their members and other interested individuals. NFHM is an occasion for experienced researchers and beginners alike to learn, research, and create.

NFHM will be launched at 5:00 pm (AEST) Tuesday, 1 August via a free talk on Zoom. University of New England's Professor of Heritage and Digital Humanities, Hamish Maxwell-Stewart together with family historian and technology enthusiast, Andrew Redfern will discuss the pros and cons of using Artificial Intelligence in Family History research.

NFHM celebrations conclude at 12 noon, Thursday 31 August at the Metcalfe Auditorium at the State Library of New South Wales. Anita Jacoby AM one of Australia's most awarded television producers will share the experience of researching her own family history for her book *Secrets Beyond the Screen* published in 2022, including how to deal with sensitive material in family history research. Copies of her book will be available for purchase on the day.

President's Update

Dear members

We are taking steps to fill the essential role of QFHS Secretary.

I will fulfil the legal requirements with the State Government's Office of Fair Trading, with

the Australian Charities and Not-for-profit Commission and with Brisbane City Council.

Knowing, from her years in various roles on the Management Committee, the critical importance of monitoring the correspondence and ensuring that enquiries from members, the public, and government are redirected to relevant persons or groups within the Society, Bev Young has volunteered to undertake the role of Assistant Secretary (Correspondence). Thank you, Bev – we are very grateful for your continued contribution.

The aspect of the Secretary's role that still needs a volunteer is that of support to the Management Committee - assisting it to function smoothly, and following up on matters requiring action.

The Society's <u>Annual Report 2023</u> includes many impressive statistics – of which these are just a few:

- Library Assistants contributed more than 2,890 hours to provide members and nonmembers alike with access to the wealth of resources available in both Gaythorne and Chermside premises
- The Research Centre at Chermside received approximately 425 visitors in the first five months of operation.
- There were 5117 'hits' on our online subscription databases, and in excess of 71,000 access 'hits' on the QFHS datasets
- Fifty three stories and articles of interest were published in the *Queensland Family Historian*, the vast majority written by our members
- Our newsletter, *Snippets*, was delivered to 9915 email inboxes and our Facebook page elicited over 27,000 responses.
- Over 7000 hours of benefit were gained from stimulating educational content and members profited from participation in Special Interest Group meetings to the tune of more than 17,000 hours
- And a multitude of individuals participated in a multitude of Community Outreach activities.

It was a significant task to draw the threads together and I am grateful to each and every one of the coordinators and convenors, the individuals, the teams and the Management Committee who provided statistics and information for their areas of responsibility. We've not necessarily systematically collected the data before, preferring to concentrate our valuable time on delivering programs and services for members, so this was somewhat of a challenge but, I believe, well worth the effort. How could any reader fail to be impressed by the breadth and depth of the services and programs provided to our members?

Further to earlier communication with members, reorganisation within Brisbane City Council has resulted in the co-location of commercial and community asset management into a single unit. Consequently, all community facility leases that Council has not completed (such as ours – all required application documents submitted in November last

year) are now required to participate in a tender process beginning in August.

We have yet to receive details of the BCC tender process itself but the criteria all applicants must address include:

- 1. Demonstrated need for activities in the local area or within Brisbane.
- 2. The proposed activities will increase community, sport, recreation and/or cultural participation levels.
- 3. Capacity and willingness to share the facility with other community organisations.
- 4. Viability of the organisation and the capacity to manage a community facility, including financial capacity to meet maintenance and operational costs and any agreed development commitments.
- 5. Commitment to continuous improvement of the community facility.

We are in the process of gathering documentary evidence to support our claims within each of these criteria. The 2023 Annual Report provides us with many of the statistics, such as those listed above, that will help us demonstrate that we are meeting a need in the community. Our membership of 860+ individuals with over 650 residing in the BCC area is a clear demonstration of community interest in what we do.

Clearly, BCC has a responsibility to ratepayers to gain as much community benefit from each of the community facilities as possible and this is reflected in criteria #3. As our use of the facility is specific to family history research and we use the facility at least 6 days a week, it cannot be 'multipurposed', so we must concentrate on forging meaningful relationships with like-minded groups. A regular program of hosting various community groups such as the visit by the Strathpine Family History Group in May and the annual visit by Caloundra Family History Research Inc will meet this criteria.

As always, to provide the intensive support necessary for these visiting groups (and for our Society) to gain maximum benefit from the event, these activities require volunteers in addition to the two Library Assistants rostered on any given day. When the call goes out for volunteers to help us spread our sphere of influence, please consider giving us a few hours every month or two and being part of the team that spreads the word about how QFHS delivers family history research satisfaction and demonstrates to BCC that we are the perfect tenant for their community facility.

I understand some members may feel jittery about the uncertainty of the tender process. And, while it's true that nothing in life is certain, I have confidence that Council's process will be fair and meticulous and that we can meet the criteria and demonstrate we are a stable, mature, reliable and inclusive community group, delivering desirable and very affordable services and programs to the community.

National Family History Month is usually the month of our annual Open Day. The very successful Irish SIG 20th Anniversary celebration in June effectively provided us with our Open Day event and 50 members of the public took guided tours through the Family History Research Centre. Thank you to all who planned and delivered the event for the Irish Interest Group and for the Society as a whole.

This year, we will celebrate NFHM by highlighting the array of our impressive 'usual'

offerings to members and invite our local community – via letterbox drops in the area (thank you, Library Assistants) and Facebook posts on local community sites (thank you, Social Media Coordinator, Alex Daw) – to join any of the seven activities we'll run during the month. Thanks also to Charlotte Sale for finding time to design the flyer.





We'll also have an advertisement and an article in the August issue of the free *Your Time* magazine. This is quite an attractive magazine so keep an eye out for it at your local shopping centre.

One of the features of **Members Lounge** activities is the opportunity, for those who can, to join us in person. The majority of our Members Lounge programs are hybrid although we have opted for online-only events at night during the winter months. The Socials are the exception and are exclusively in-person. They're perfect for those who love a get-together and have missed these opportunities in recent years.

The Members Lounge Social for July was an excursion to the Queensland State Archives where the group enjoyed a 'behind the scenes' tour through the archives and additional instruction on how to access records in the archives. Those who stayed on in the afternoon to research were very happy with records they'd ordered from storage and all were full of praise for the staff at the State Archives. It was a most successful event and likely one we will repeat early next year.

Our Members Lounge Social event for August will be another coffee morning on Monday 28th, this time with the theme of Stories of the Women in our Families. We know that women's stories are often difficult to uncover so let's celebrate National Family History Month together by sharing a photo or an artefact and a few facts or deductions about one of the women in your family history. We've decided on a Monday this time so Library Assistants don't miss out due to their commitments to the Family History Research Centre.

Location is yet to be determined but will be somewhere between Gaythorne and Chermside. Register here so we can contact you with the location.

In the meantime, there are several other free events for you in the Members Lounge: *Book Club, What's New?, Talking About...* a variety of interesting topics, *Presenting...* guest speakers and *Family History Toolkit*. All are designed to add value to your membership of Queensland Family History Society.

I look forward to seeing you in the Members Lounge sometime soon.






