# **President's Update**

#### **Dear members**

As another eventful year for the Society draws to a close, we're taking the opportunity of the final issue of Snippets to thank and recognise all the volunteers who've contributed in a multitude of ways to the year's successes.

While it's not possible to list every single individual, we'd like to acknowledge the various teams who've made it possible for the Society to function and deliver a variety of programs and services to members throughout the year:

- Our Library Assistants, and roster wrangler, Dette Glenday, without whom the Family History Research Centre could not open for member research and who provide frontline assistance to researchers; and the Research and AskQFHS teams who respond to all sorts of enquiries online.
- The TAG team without whom we'd not have IT equipment available for use at the Research Centre, digital resources available for remote and local access and reliably functioning v-Library software and hybrid meeting equipment
- The Print Library and the Maps teams who make print and electronic resources available – a marvellous variety of books, microforms, maps, and journals from family history societies far and wide
- The Education, Members Lounge and Special Interest Group teams which deliver inspiring and informative member programs in a variety of formats to members far and wide.
- The Membership team that manage new memberships and renewals (a not inconsiderable task for a membership of 850+), and who welcome and orientate new members so they can best utilise the wonderful resources we have available for them.
- The Indexing and Digitising teams which generate important new indexes and digital records, and quality materials for members to use in their quest for uncovering the lives of their ancestors.
- The Community Outreach team which arranges for a QFHS presence with quality display materials at community events and provides speakers to community groups.
- The Communications team which publishes Snippets each month and the
  Queensland Family Historian journal each quarter, manages social media channels,
  publicises the Society's activities, updates the website, creates videos to record our
  events and provide instruction in the use of various resources,
- The Operations team which keeps the Society functioning by taking care of the
  physical facility and all consumables for kitchen and copiers/printers; who manage
  the book shop, pay the bills, order new plant and equipment, design emergency

response procedures, review important aspects of the Society such as our constitution and by-laws, privacy policy, codes of ethics and conduct; who wrangle the calendar, and the various applications we use to deliver our services and programs – Zoom, Eventbrite, MailChimp, and SurveyMonkey; those who coordinate and judge the Family History Book Award; and who liaise with our major affiliates – our commercial subscription databases, state and national libraries and archives, state and national peak family history organisations.

It's impressive, isn't it? Some of these teams are specifically mentioned in this issue of Snippets (can you imagine the length of Snippets if we'd included them all?) and each will be included progressively in some form or other in each issue of Snippets during 2024.

While we have an impressive number of volunteers (90+ making regular contributions and another dozen or so who consistently volunteer for one-off activities), there is always movement with volunteers retiring from roles or relocating and no longer able to continue with their hands-on activities – or because there is an increased need for expanded services in particular areas. We currently have a pressing need in the Communications, Education and TAG teams – all very important areas in the Society's ability to successfully deliver member services and programs.

We ask all members to please consider the win-win opportunities of volunteering. Of course, the Society (and therefore, all members) significantly benefits from the generosity of volunteers but the individuals volunteering also benefit – from the company of others with similar interests, from the satisfaction of helping others, from opportunities to develop new skills, extend knowledge, and further their own research are

No matter what your interest or your skills or talents, or your time availability, there is definitely a niche in the Society for you as a volunteer, and by strengthening teams we make volunteering a collaborative task, even if some of the projects have significant opportunities for autonomy within the teams.
