The collection consists of scans of ledger books and includes the individual receiving the loan and two guarantors, often neighbours or close relatives. These people were too poor to be listed in street directories, but not poor enough to be listed in a poor relief record. 

## **Book Review**



Dawson, V. Chinchilla's Communal Settlers. The early 1890's was a difficult period in Queensland's history. The government was faced with an economic downturn while the great flood of 1893 wreaked havoc in Brisbane and its surrounds. To assist those who were basically destitute the government passed legislation enabling men within certain criteria to restart their lives in what we might think of as communes.

Veronica Dawson has traced the development of three such communal settlements in the Chinchilla area - Mizpah, Monmouth and Mulga. Ms Dawson discusses the progress (or lack thereof) of each settlement and provides mini biographies of members of each
