Brisbane River Ferry Disaster of 1896

Paul Seto is the author of '1896 s.s. "Pearl" Ferry Capsizing near Victoria Bridge, Brisbane River' (2011, 2015), and is our speaker at our members' meeting at 1:00 pm on 18th March.

Brisbane's worst disaster, by the number of deaths, occurred on Thursday 13th February 1896. The river steamer s.s 'Pearl' capsized just south of Victoria Bridge when being used as a temporary passenger ferry.

About ninety people were on board, a third of them drowned. Bodies were recovered all along the Brisbane river from the old Dry Dock, New Farm, Breakfast Creek, Hamilton and all the way out to Moreton Bay. The last body was recovered on the south end of Bribie Island some weeks later.

Paul will use his historical knowledge and family history research to tell us of the event, including heart-wrenching quotes from newspapers of the time. We will also hear some life stories of the people who were drowned, saved, or are still missing. In 1896 Paul's great-grandmother, the well-known soprano Mildred Sanders, sang at several fundraising benefit concerts for the 'sufferers of the Pearl disaster'.

It includes the wills of people from other states and countries, typically where the individual was a resident of New South Wales but their last place of residence was outside the state, or where they had originated from overseas and left legacies to family members 'back home'. New Zealand Cemetery Records Online

More than 1.6 million records from 1,400 NZ cemeteries are now available at Ancestry. The records cover the years 1800-2007. Each typically contains name, birth date, death date, and cemetery name and plot location. It may also provide information about a spouse, cause of death, military dates, an epitaph, or even a description of the headstone. Available for free at the QFHS library or via subscription here.

WWI Unit War Diaries

1.5 million WWI unit war diaries are now available online to search and download here.

Gloucestershire Parish Record Indexes

More than 861,000 baptism, marriage and burial records from Gloucestershire have been added to Findmypast's collection of UK Parish records. Each record consists of a transcription of the original document. Read the full article here.

The Clergy Database

Clergy of the Church of England Database 1540-1835 makes available records of clerical careers from more than 50 archives in England and Wales, providing coverage of clerical lives from the Reformation to the mid-nineteenth century. Find it here.

Early Irish Birth Index

The Irish Genealogical Research Society has launched the Early Irish Birth Index. It holds more than 5,000 records from alternative sources for births in Ireland, including early Irish census records, Registry of Deeds' memorials, newspapers, gravestone inscriptions, diaries and letters. The number of indexed names exceeds 10,400. Unlike the Marriage Index, which is free to all researchers, the Birth Index is a resource for IGRS Members only. Non-members can make a free surname-only search to find out how many entries match their search criteria. Find it here.

470 copies of the Dublin Police Gazette or Hue and Cry covering a selection from 1863-1893 are now available online. They contain details of apprehensions sought, property and animals stolen, and apprehensions made, almost all with detailed descriptions. Earlier copies include an army deserters list focused on Irish recruits while later copies replaced this with a list of habitual criminals recently released from prison. Victims of crime are frequently mentioned and, where individuals are sought by the police, their mother's surname was also often included. The price is £2 per image or £3 to download the whole document / newspaper with payment by Paypal. Find it here.

Records of Mannheim, Germany

Ancestry has added birth, marriage and death records from Mannheim, Germany. The 152,000 birth records span the time period from 1870 to 1900. The 137,000 marriage records are from 1870 to 1920 and the 234,000 death records are from 1870 to 1950. Available free at the QFHS library or by subscription here.

Belgian Births, Deaths and Marriages

FamilySearch has added a large number of images of civil registration records from Belgium, primarily birth, marriage and death records and some marriage proclamation records. The largest new addition is some 800,000 images from Limburg (1798 to 1906). Other regions with new additions include Antwerp (1588 to 1909), Hainaut (1600 to 1913) and West Flanders (1582 to 1910). The Rochester (New York) Genealogical Society

A number of historical church and town records from the region are available online, contained in some 200,000 pages of scanned documents. The church records can be browsed by individual church here.

Kentucky Death Index 2000 - 2012

This database has been converted from PDF files and currently contains the years 2000-2012. This index is not an official record of death, actual death certificates must be ordered from the Office of Vital Statistics. The death certificate number is not included as it was not part of the original PDF index. You can access this and other databases of the Boyd County Library here.

Publication of information from birth, marriage and death certificates in England and Wales will soon be available in other (cheaper) forms than as a certified copy. More details here.

Making Babies from DNA of 3 People

This should complicate record keeping for genealogists! The British parliament has voted to allow the creation of human embryos from the DNA of three people to try to eradicate a type of genetic disease that has caused the deaths of thousands of babies. If the measure also passes through the House of Lords, England would become the first country to legalise the procedure and the first three-parent baby could be born as soon as next year. 
Canada's Census Debate

The debate in Canada about their census shows no signs of being resolved. Much centers around a provision in proposed laws to not make the release of census records' data mandatory after 92 years – the person filling out the census forms would have to explicitly give permission to allow this to occur. Another debate concerns a proposal to delete the presently required mandatory jail time for anyone who does not fill out a census form! You can read more here.

Australian Census Under Threat

There is uncertainty surrounding the Australian national census, with the next one due to be collected in 2016. The Australian Bureau of Statistics is looking for alternative ways to collect the data, including making it a less-frequent event. Read more about the proposals here and here and here.

Book Review



In Digging up Plugstreet Martin Brown and Richard Osgood track the fortunes of soldiers in the 3rd Australian Infantry Division in WWI. This book differs from most in that the authors have used archaeology as the vehicle for the story.

Australian soldiers were prepared for the battlefields of Europe in encampments on Salisbury Plain and these skills were used in the Battle of Messines which began on 7 June 1917. This arena bordered on Ploegsteert Wood in Belgium and became known as "Plugstreet".

The archaeological finds help create a picture of what life was really like for these Australian soldiers. It

culminates in the unearthing of the remains of two Australians who paid the ultimate price. It is a fascinating read.

The text is accompanied by many photographs of the archaeological finds, maps, documents, and other items of interest. 200pp, indexed with an extensive bibliography. Review courtesy of Pam Masel.
