Web Wanderings

New Australian additions to Findmypast

The following record sets are now available at Findmypast. Each set can be searched for free at the QFHS library or by subscription through the links given.



- New South Wales Macquarie Park Cemetery Transcriptions 1922-2001: an index of more than 72,000 headstone inscriptions. Located in North Ryde, northwest Sydney, it was originally known as the Northern Suburbs General Cemetery. In 2004 it was renamed as Macquarie Park Cemetery and Crematorium. Search the records here.
- Queensland Immigrants nominated for passage 1884-1907: lists more than 1,700 names of immigrants and nominators kept by the Assistant Immigration Agent in Maryborough. Search the records here.
- The Queensland Register of Immigrants 1864-1878: lists more than 800 applications for passage certificates for immigration registered in Toowoomba.
 Search the records here.
- 1887-1906, Queensland Passage certificates 1887-1874: an index of transcripts
 of passenger certificates from the Queensland State Archives. These free to
 search records were taken from a register kept by the Sub-Immigration Agent at
 Warwick and lists applications by sponsors of immigrants. Search them here.
- Queensland Land Orders 1861-1874: more than 29,000 transcripts taken from registers of land orders issued to immigrants on the completion of their obligations under the Immigration Act, 1864-1869. Search the records here.
- New South Wales, Cemetery, Military, and Church Record Transcripts, 1816–1982: 190,180 new indexed records added to the existing collection here.
- Tasmania, Miscellaneous Records, 1829–1961: added indexed records to an existing collection of prisoners' records, court records, occupation and guild records. Search them here.

Forces War Records WW1 Medical Records

Forces War Records has now transcribed and digitised 100,000 hand-written records from the Military Hospitals Admissions and Discharge Registers WW1 collection, enabling a search by name. What remains of the records is a sample comprising just 2% of the original, with the rest having been destroyed in space saving exercises. Originals are kept at the National Archives as series MH106, and can only be searched by Medical Unit. Search them here.

England's Immigrant Records 1330-1550 Now Online

A new database of immigration data in medieval England, held in the records at The National Archives, has been launched online. Researchers can search more than 65,000 immigrants who were resident in England during this period by name, nationality, profession and place of residence. Search here.

Additions to Findmypast UK

The following record sets are now available at Findmypast. Each set can be searched for free at the QFHS library or by subscription at the given link.

- Lancashire, Manchester Cholera Victims 1832: contains detailed notes relating to the first 200 cases of the 1832 Cholera epidemic in Manchester. The outbreak peaked in August, in which about half of the reported cases occurred, and then tailed off to end in January of 1833. Search here.
- 257 volumes of British Trade Union Membership Registers: digitised images of original record books from nine different unions, including details for individual members such as payments made, benefits received, names of spouses, profiles of leading members, directories of secretaries and details of Union activities and proceedings. Search here.
- Britain, Trade Union Members, Service and Casualties 1914-1918: contains
 more than 61,000 records for members of 18 different unions. This is a collection
 of union documents from the war years, it includes individuals who were not
 direct participants in WWI, with daily trade union news and business, frequently
 acknowledging members who have left for war or joined the services. Search it
 here.
- Findmypast is working with Bethlem Royal Hospital in London to make its
 extensive patient records from 1683 to 1932 available online. Over 248,000
 records, many including photos, reveal the lives and stories of its inmates. Go
 here to discover more.

1865 Scottish Valuation Rolls

The Valuation Rolls for 1865 have just been added to the ScotlandsPeople website, comprising 1.3 million indexed names and 76,512 digital images. Searchable by both name and address they cover every owner, tenant and occupier of property in 1865, offering a fascinating window into the lives of mid-Victorian Scots. The indexes are free to search until 19 April 2015, and images can be viewed for 2 credits per page. Enjoy searching here.

Additions to Findmypast for Ireland

The following record sets are now available at Findmypast. Each set can be searched for free at the QFHS library or by subscription through the links given.

- Historic Irish newspapers: more than 1.6 million new articles have been added, including updates to 36 existing titles and five brand new titles. The latest additions are from all over Ireland Belfast Protestant Journal, Current Prices of Grain at Dublin Corn Exchange, Newry Herald and Down, Armagh and Louth Journal, Tipperary Vindicator and Weekly Vindicator. Search them here.

Enhanced Irish Genealogist Database

The annual journal of the Irish Genealogical Research Society, The Irish Genealogist, has been published annually since 1937. It contains thousands of articles relating to Irish genealogy. A free online Names Index to the journal, with more than a quarter of a million names, is available on the Society's website. In a new development, the database will now link researchers directly to articles that match their search criteria. Initially images from volume 10 are available, covering the years 1998-2001, with regular releases right up to volume 13 (up to 2013) to follow. Search it here.

If you have Irish ancestry then you're in luck! The Free Irish Genealogy eBooks website is an index to about 4,000 free online books and journals on the topics of Irish, Irish-American, Irish-Australian and Irish-Canadian Genealogy – all of which can all be read online and most can also be downloaded. Alaska Genealogy Information

AlaskaWeb will interest anyone with ancestral links to Alaska. Perhaps a relative was one of the more than 100,000 people from around the world who went to Alaska in the gold rush, or one of the thousands of military servicemen stationed there over the years. It contains more than 4,600 pages of data, mostly about Alaskan history. The site provides a lot of Alaskan history in those times, history that your relatives probably saw and experienced. Marriage Notices in Lansingburgh (NY) Newspapers 1787 – 1895

The Troy Irish Genealogy Society has an index to marriage notices in ten different Lansingburgh, New York, newspapers from 1787 to 1895. 2,712 marriage notices covering 5,424 names are now available to search online. To see these records go here.

A New Genealogy Website: Genealogy Gophers

Are you looking for a genealogy book? More than 40,000 digital genealogy books are now fully searchable and downloadable for free here. The website searches genealogy books only, looking for the information you specify. Best of all, the site is available free of charge.

A New Genetic Map of the U.K.

Researchers have found genetic signatures among Britons that identify their historical roots in particular locales, leading to the finest-scale map of genetic variation yet created. The analysis shows a snapshot of clusters of genetic variation in the late 1800s, when people were less likely to migrate far from their region of birth. It reflects historical waves of migration by different populations into the island. Find out more here.

Eneclann and Ancestor Network have announced their return to the genealogy service in The National Library of Ireland in Dublin from 18 March to 31 October. When many French-speaking people moved to areas where English was the predominant language, they often adopted new surnames based on their French surnames. An impressive list of English surnames and their French equivalents are available here.

30% of White British Share Ancestors with Germans

The Romans, Vikings and Normans may have ruled or invaded the British for hundreds of years, but they left barely a trace on our DNA, the first detailed study of the genetics of British people has revealed. Analysis shows that the Anglo-Saxons were the only conquering force, around 400-500 AD, to substantially alter the country's genetic makeup, with most white British people now owing almost 30% of their DNA to the ancestors of modern-day Germans. Ancient Pedigree Chart Auctioned for £30,000

A pedigree written in Latin on a 23-foot-long calf skin in the 1500s describing the genealogy of the Kings of England was recently auctioned for £30,000. It is believed be one of only 13 left in the world, charting royalty from the legends of Hely and Cassilbellan in the first century BC up until the end of the Wars of the Roses in 1485, with specific mention of King Richard III.
