Queensland Cemetery Records 1802-1990

This FamilySearch.org index combines several indexes, cemetery transcriptions, burial and other records from cemeteries in Queensland. The collection, containing 2,069,202 indexed images, also includes some areas of New South Wales, Norfolk Island, Tasmania, and Western Australia. Findmypast

The following are available via subscription, or free at the QFHS library.

- New South Wales Gaol Photographic Books (1871-1969). Contains over 29,000 records, and consists of entries of prisoners from 14 gaols around the state. The records contain transcripts and scans of the original prisoner entries, and mug shots of individual inmates. Search here.
- New South Wales Government Gazette Indexes (1832-1863). Consist of over 1.2 million transcripts containing rich details of life in NSW. The information is of an administrative and bureaucratic nature and can reveal details of your ancestor's property, occupation, transactions, and other useful biographical information. Each record includes a transcript of the original document. Search here.
- Essex Wills Beneficiaries Index (1505-1916). Contains more than 156,000 records. The index records all people mentioned in a will, with the exception of witnesses and those with the same name as the testator e.g. beneficiaries, relatives, executors, trustees, occupiers of property, adjacent landowners. Each record contains a transcript and an image of the index. Search here.
- Craven's Part in the Great War (1914-1919). Contains in excess of 4000 records. It was designed to serve as a memento of the part that the district of Craven in Yorkshire played in the Great War. The memorial is divided into two main sections. The first is a nominal roll containing names, ranks and regiments, while the second section is a roll of honour. It includes photographs supplied by the families of the deceased. Search here.
- British Newspapers (1710-1953). Fifteen (15) new titles and in excess of 5.3

- million articles have recently been added to the collection, which now stands at over 124 million articles from across England, Scotland and Wales. Substantial additions have also occurred to existing titles, including the Fife Herald and Derbyshire Courier. Search here.
- British Mariners, Trinity House Calendars (1787 to 1854). These are now fully searchable by surname. The records contain the details of British Mariners who petitioned for aid from the Corporation of Trinity House of Deptford Strond. Trinity House was responsible for the supervision of lighthouses and buoys around the English coast and also distributed charitable funds to disabled seamen and their families across the United Kingdom. Applications for help known as 'Petitions' and were submitted by seamen or their relatives to Trinity House. Each record contains an image and a transcription. Most records will include the petitioner's name, their relationship to the mariner, their age, location, circumstances and the date of their petition. Search here.
- Royal Artillery Officer Deaths (1850-2011). Contains more than 17 000 records. The index lists the details of commissioned officers who were died during WW1, WW2, Kosovo, Bosnia, Borneo and Iraq. Each record includes a transcript of details found in the original records. Search here.
- Royal Artillery War Commemoration Book (1914-1918). An alphabetical list of 3505 Officers of the Royal Regiment of Artillery who died during WW1. Each record includes an image of the original record and a transcript. Search here.
- Royal Artillery Officers (1716-1899). Contains more than 7400 records.
 Officers in this list served in many countries. Each record includes an image from the original publication and a transcript. Search here.
- Royal Artillery, 80th Field Regiment (1939-1945). Provides details for the 978
 men who served with the Regiment. Each record is a transcript of information
 found in original records. Search here.
- Clacton Roll of Honour (1914-1918). Contains the records of more than 1100 men from Clacton-on-Sea in Essex who were killed during the First World War.
 Each record contains a transcript and an image. Search here.
- United States Civil War Pension Files Index (1861-1934). Contains more than

 million records of pension application cards for veterans and their
 beneficiaries. Each record includes a transcript, with many including an image of
 the original index card. Most transcripts will list the applicant's name and year of
 application. The images may reveal the veteran's unit, the time he applied for the
 pension, names of his widow or children, pension application numbers, previous
 pension application numbers, certificate numbers, and the name of his attorney.

Rare 1928 Photos of England in Colour

In the late 1920s and early 1930s National Geographic sent photographer Clifton R. Adams to England to record its farms, towns and cities, as well as its people at work and play. UK Ordinance Survey Adds Four New Products to its Open Data Portfolio

A resource for anyone wanting to know where their UK ancestors lived or worked. If you find an address in an old record, this website probably can show you the location on a free map. More details <u>here</u>.

Illinois Civil War Soldier Photos Online

One of the biggest collections of Illinois soldiers is available here. It is a repository for photographs of more than 8,000 Illinois soldiers who served in the Civil War. In addition to the names, regiments and companies in which soldiers served, other relevant information is included when it has been verified: where the soldiers were from originally, their residence at enlistment, the dates and the studios where the photographs were taken, and whether the photographs are tintypes, cartes-de-visite, or cabinet cards. Michigan Death Certificates (1921-1939)

Digitised images of Michigan death certificates from 1921 to 1939 are now freely available online. Search <u>here</u>.

Polish American Marriage Database (1892-1940)

Compiled by The Polish Genealogical Society of Connecticut and the Northeast Inc. This database contains the names of couples of Polish origin who were married in select locations in North-Eastern United States. Browse here.

General items of interest

Online Copies of Irish Ancestor

This journal, published since 1937, contains hundreds of articles on Irish genealogy. The articles can be searched by family name and first name. Access is free here.

The Digital Public Library of America (DPLA)

The DPLA is a general-purpose library that has a wealth of genealogical material. A search on the word "genealogy" returns a list of thousands of items available via the

library's online portal. An "item" might be information about a book, a photograph, a manuscript, a sound recording, music score, chart, map, moving image, or other object. An introductory video about the Digital Public Library of America may be viewed here.

The menus and search methods vary from one site to another. Try searching for both people's names and their locations. Also, consider searching for keywords associated with fraternal organisations, religious affiliations, for example.



Book Review



In The Gold Digger's Arms, Brett Stubbs presents local history with a difference. It is a history of the Upper Clarence River District, the area bounded by the Great Dividing Range in the west, the Richmond Range in the east, Tenterfield in the south and the Queensland border in the north. From the 1840s dray traffic was criss-crossing this area as settlement pushed north. Obviously, a pub would follow; they were wayside inns. In its

busiest period, the area supported at least 50 pubs. Today only six remain operational. Numerous maps and photographs support this history, together with biographical details of some of the better-known publicans. The work is sourced and indexed.

Located in the Atlantic Ocean, east of Key Biscayne, Florida, the Neptune Memorial Reef was created in 2007. The Neptune Society's ultimate goal is to create a 16-acre underwater city containing the remains of 125 000 people. Currently, the reef is the final resting place of a few hundred. Wounded as a Slave, Died Free

Thanks to a genealogist's death certificate research, a Civil War story has been uncovered and the original story corrected. Hannah Reynolds was the lone civilian death at the Battle of Appomattox Court House. She died a slave at 60, hours before the war to end slavery unofficially came to a close. A century and a half later, Reynolds' story is being rewritten: a new discovery by a genealogist shows that she lingered for several days – long enough to have died a free woman.
