
State Library of Queensland: Family History Day: Find Your Soldier

The digitised records cover British, Irish and Commonwealth casualties from the
Second World War, together with records for most other nationals commemorated at
CWGC sites: this includes the records for German soldiers. The documents give a
unique insight into the process of commemoration undertaken by the armed forces and
the CWGC during and after the war, and include details of personal headstone
inscriptions, date of death, rank, regiment and even some documents which show the
journey of the deceased to their final resting place. The records are freely available to
the public through the CWGC website

More Than 1,000 Biographies Posted on GenealogyMagazine.com

In the late 1800s and early 1900s, publishing companies sent representatives across America to compile local histories and interview area residents. To finance the printing, representatives sold pre-publication copies. These volumes are sometimes known as "mug books." Those wanting to see their biography in print had to purchase the book in advance.

However, "mug books" are often valuable sources for the genealogist. Interviewees were typically asked their full name, date and place of birth, names of parents, name of spouse, names of spouse's parents, and names of children. Names of grandparents, siblings, and aunts and uncles are frequently found as well. You can find the more than 1,300 biographical sketches for free here

Book - Callan Park: Compassion and Conflict in the Asylum

Friends of Callan Park and Oral History New South Wales held a joint launch of Callan Park: Compassion and Conflict in The Asylum. It followed the recent exhibition of the same name for the National Trust's Heritage Festival where the interest and curiosity about the stories of the people who were patients at Callan Park, or lived in the housing on site or worked its wards was so high that Friends of Callan Park decided to publish the exhibition panels together with linking pages which set the context. Certificate of Irish Heritage Abandoned

The Certificate of Irish Heritage was a good idea even though it always was a bit controversial. It was basically a scheme for the Irish government to raise a bit of money from Irish descendants around the world. The certificates were issued to descendants of Irish citizens who don't qualify for Irish citizenship themselves, but are willing to pay up €40 for a piece of paper to prove their Irish roots.

The certificates were essentially useless. The Irish Government has now announced it is cancelling the program to sell Certificates of Irish Heritage. The announcement stated that sales had been "considerably less than anticipated." You can read more here


Copyright Law Reform

Book Review



Kim Phillips has chosen 100 Australian soldiers who lost their lives in the eight months on the Gallipoli peninsula to produce a fascinating record of the period. It is not a typical military history but rather takes each selected soldier and weaves his mini biography plus the action of the day. The Spirits of Gallipoli: A Centenary of Anzacs presents a host of photographs, relevant maps and sketches and above all the voices of these men as they write home or in their diaries. The book of 340 pages is accompanied by a CD which contains over 50000 files. As the forward states this work "will prove an invaluable tool for present and future researchers."
