Searching for Information about criminals in the Victorian era

Historians have been handed hundreds of mugshots of Victorian criminals. Now, armed only with the pictures and names, they are searching for the stories behind the stares, putting a crime to the face. Each image shows the arrested individual with their name written in chalk either on a board held in front of them or, in later years, on a slate above their heads. However, none of the entries give any identifying information about the people in the photographs nor is there any information about their crimes. You can read more about this mugbook here

British Archives: First World War Unit War Diaries

More diaries have recently been added to this online resource. For researchers and family historians, the war diaries contain a wealth of information of far greater interest than the army could ever have predicted, and provide unrivalled insight into daily events on the front line. Search the unit war diaries here

1939 Register of England and Wales

The 1939 Register is the most comprehensive survey of the population of wartime England and Wales. It contains the personal details of 41 million people, captured on a single day in September 1939 and has recently been released.

Records will be available to purchase for £6.95 per household, or £24.95 for our 5 household bundle (£4.99 per household). Findmypast subscribers will be entitled to a discount. In addition, some records will be closed. As either because the individual recorded is still living and less than 100 years old or proof of death has not been verified. At time of launch 28 million records will be searchable. The Register will be updated weekly. Search the Register here



DNA Study Helps Solve Abraham Lincoln Lineage Debate

The ancestry of Abraham Lincoln's mother, Nancy Hanks Lincoln, has been debated for a long time. While several theories have been published, none of them included convincing proof. Now a new DNA study by a group of five researchers working with Family Tree DNA has solved a 150-year-old mystery surrounding the true identity of Nancy Hanks Lincoln's mother. The results of the Nancy Hanks Lincoln mtDNA Study have been published here.

Rediscovered Leather Trunk Contains Thousands of Letters from the 17th Century A 300-year-old linen-lined trunk filled with over 2,600 letters that were mailed out, but never received, between the years 1680 and 1706, has recently been discovered in The Hague, Netherlands. The extraordinary collection contains letters from all manner of society, including aristocrats, merchants, lovers, actors, musicians, and even spies. Book Review



Madame Mallalieu by Professor Peter Roennfeldt is a work which can be enjoyed at several levels. We can follow the interesting but somewhat turbulent personal life of Henrietta Percival (1842 - 1938). With the death of her father while she was in her infancy she was raised in a home where music provided both pleasure and economic stability. By adolescence she was in demand in musical circles but a disastrous first marriage left her to fall back on music for economic support.

After her second marriage to Alfred Mallalieu they arrived in Queensland in 1864 at a time when the colony of Queensland was in its infancy. One can be led to believe that it was a cultural wilderness but this work takes the reader through interesting

musical times. In a "replay" of her childhood, music was an economic support. It is in this strand of the book that one can appreciate Brisbane's music life. Henrietta taught almost from the time she landed. She offered herself as a pianist, organist and singer.

A third marriage was to follow and she and Walter Willmore were prominent in performing circles as well as in planning discussions for the new Exhibition Building in Bowen Park, especially the purchase of an organ. This marriage also failed. Henrietta was active in affairs other than music. She was prominent in Queensland Women's Electoral League with a firm belief that women be active in politics. Lastly her legacy remains in Mallalieu Home, the former Rubato, which provided home and shelter as a QCWA hostel until the 1990's.

Henrietta Percival's life story is a fascinating read. These snippets do not do it justice. A work of 300 pages it is indexed and sourced with detailed appendices. (CopyRight Publishing). Review courtesy of Pam Masel.
