They are a total of 10 fiche (including card) of St. Stephen's Roman Catholic Cathedral baptisms from 1844 to 1993. These are of heritage importance to us all. Would the person/s responsible for their removal please return them asap to the library by placing them in the pigeon hole of Lyn Hooper, located in the Cabinet Room, or in an envelope placed on the LA front desk.

Our microfilm collection has recently had many thousands of dollars spent on the preservation of both fiche and film which hopefully will last us for decades to come. # Treasures from the QFHS CD Collection

Some items in the QFHS microfilm collection had been deteriorating substantially, as evidenced by a strong vinegary smell. Fortuitously, last year the representative who supports the use of the library's ViewScan offered to have fifteen of these microfilms digitised free of charge. All are now in pdf format and available both via the Category Menu and v-Library. Some of the newspaper editions (e.g. *Queensland Times* 1891) are available on Trove; however, most are not readily available from another source – e.g. The *New York Times* (1978-1980), *The Bulletin* (1896-1897, 1979). The digitised microfilms also include birth, death and marriage records – e.g. The Parish Register Society's English *Parish Registers* (Vol. 26-84), *Warwick* (*Qld*) *Burial Register* (1868-1958), *Galway Tithe Applotment Books*.

However, these documents cannot be keyword searched, merely browsed. The *Warwick Burial Register* is a hand written document, similar to the Queensland *School Admission Registers* held in digitised form by QFHS. Report courtesy of Geoff Morgan

#### Occupations in the 1841 Census

Many of the occupations recorded on the censuses don't exist anymore, so it can be hard to know how common our ancestors' occupations were - and sometimes we may struggle even to decipher what has been written, especially in the 1841 Census (because the enumerators wrote in pencil). In 1844 James Gilbert published a useful summary of the occupations recorded in the 1841 England, Wales, and Scotland censuses which is available for free <a href="here">here</a>.

#### **Dublin Metropolitan Police Prisoners Books are now online**

The Dublin Metropolitan Police Prisoners Books for 1905-1908 and 1911-1918 are amongst the most valuable new documents to come to light on the revolutionary decade. They include important information on social and political life in the capital during the last years of the Union, from the period of widespread anticipation of Home Rule, to the advent of the 1913 Lockout, the outbreak of the First World War, the Easter Rising and its aftermath, including the conscription crisis of 1918. They will also be invaluable to those interested in criminology, genealogy, and family

#### **New Records online for County Westmeath**

Westmeath Genealogy has added 36,000 new records to its <u>online database</u> The new records include Mullingar death records, Westmeath Gravestone inscriptions and various baptisms and marriages between the years 1900 to 1920. Each record consists of a transcript of the information recorded in the original list. Each transcripts will list your ancestor's name, service number, rank, regiment, service branch and home address

#### The Social Security Death Index (SSDI) is still available

The Social Security Death Index (often called the SSDI) is a valuable tool for genealogists. It lists deceased people within the United States. When first created, the SSDI only listed those people who were receiving Social Security benefit payments at the time of death. However, as the years went by, the database was expanded to include almost all deaths, whether receiving benefits or not. The Social Security Administration (SSA) Death Master File (DMF) contains more than 80 million records of deaths that have been reported to SSA. You can search it online here

#### **World Memory Project**

An effort to build a free online database of Holocaust victims and survivors has reached a milestone. The United States Holocaust Memorial Museum and Ancestry.com have announced that records of one million people persecuted by the Nazis are now available to be searched. The crowd-sourced database was launched in 2011 and is known as the World Memory Project. You can read more about the World Memory Project here.

Troy Irish Genealogy's new database, St. Joseph's Cemetery, Waterford, New York
This new data base covers interments from 1862 to 2013 and lists 17,237 names.
As this cemetery was operated by the French speaking St. Joseph's Church in



Developments in Toowoomba have always played a crucial role in developments of what has become the south-east corner of Queensland. Diana Beal has tracked its very early manufacturing growth from 1840 through to 1914 in the area known since early days as Black Gully. This area is easily identified in the clearly reproduced early land holding map and its later subdivision into estates. Speculation follows the opening up of land much as night follows day. Ms Beal has identified the early speculators, big and small, in a series of mini biographies.

Settlers followed and with them the industries vital to a developing area such as Toowoomba. The Black Gully area would not have been a choice residential area with several tanneries rendering the air "malodorous". Providing for the growing population led to more farms and associated industries such as flour mills, butcheries, a bacon factory and as might be guessed - hotels.

In the period 1895 to 1914 the subdivision of land became what the writer refers to as "a real estate agents' paradise". Early settlers were dying or retiring and large parcels of land came on the market. The necessary infrastructure bloomed. Tracks became streets, old roads were revamped. The railway arrived and so the Toowoomba of today emerged.
