They will discuss the issues that may arise for you in the way you gift your research and some of the issues which may arise for your executors and trustees when dealing with the research you have bequeathed to an individual or organisation.

She has held varied positions including Scientist (Materials Conservation) at the Queensland Museum; Manager, Preservation Services, Queensland State Archives; Manager, Publications Reformatting and Coordinator, Reformatting at the State Library of Queensland. Christine is an active member of the Australian Society of Archivists (Qld Branch) and a Professional Member of the Australian Institute for the Conservation of Material Inc (AICCM), the peak body for Conservators in Australia.

Treasures from the QFHS CD collection

If we are to gain a deeper understanding of various families and individuals of interest to us as Family Historians, then we are interested in embedding their lives within the localities and times in which they lived. The QFHS Library & Resource Centre has many resources in various forms to assist us with that intent.

A search of v-Library will reveal many CDs focussed on particular places of interest – for example, on Warwick & the Darling Downs to the early 1920s (Hall, n.d.), the Moreton Bay Settlement to 1859 (Craig, 1925), The Gladstone Colony (Hogan, 1898). Many early accounts, such as Hall's, do not contain indexes to aid our research. However, a personal history such as his is more likely to include mention of people other than the most influential in the district.

These accounts may also reveal such curiosities as that of the first Church of England clergyman on the Darling Downs, the Reverend Glennie – he and horses did not make for happy relationships, so he regularly walked from Drayton to Warwick, conducting church services on the way. He also walked from Warwick to Brisbane for the enthronement of the first Bishop of Brisbane, Edward Tufnell, in 1860.

If one is interested in the early history of Brisbane, a CD that presents aerial photos of selected parts of the city (c1936) may be of interest. Should your ancestors have resided in the Landsborough Shire between 1912 and 1941, then you may find reference to them in lists of payments and receipts, or of rates levied.

By using the name of the locality of interest as a Keyword for a <u>v-Library search</u>, you may well identify resources that will assist in fleshing out the lives of your 'persons of interest'. This you can do at home (from the QFHS website) so that you come prepared with a list of CDs and other resources to focus your research during your next visit to the library.



Book Review



Roulston, W. Researching Scottish-Irish Ancestors:

The Essential Genealogical Guide to Early Modern Ulster. Whether your ancestors are of English, Scottish or Gaelic Irish origin this book should be of enormous value to those researching in this area. First published in 2005 that this book is now in its 6th printing would suggest that it is a valued resource for the period 1600 to 1800.

Dr Roulston sets out his guide in clear terms. In 262 pages he outlines records which are of research value, and where to locate them. The sources are from Antrim, Armagh, Cavan, Derry, Donegal, Down, Fermanagh, Monaghan and Tyrone. He also provides guidance in how to extract information from a variety of sources.
