Christine lanna: Christine has worked in the Museum and Materials Conservation





Treasures in the QFHS CD Collection

Continuing the theme from the last edition of *Snippets*, the focus for this month is *The history of Queensland: its people and industries*, commonly referred to as *Fox's History of Queensland*. Archive Digital Books Australasia digitised this document, which was published in three volumes from 1919 to 1923. The information presented well satisfies a family historian's desire to embed the lives of ancestors into the locality and times in which they lived. Each volume contains a detailed Table of Contents.

Not only do the CDs present accounts of early Queensland history (e.g. the development of railways, noted explorers and political events), they also provide descriptions of the main regions into which Queensland is divided. Overviews of the main population centres in each region, although general in nature, provide insights into the state of development of these towns and localities post-World War One. Most importantly, Volumes 2 and 3 present biographies of prominent individuals in early Queensland, each accompanied by a photo of the individual being discussed. An Index to the biographies is included at the end of Volume 3. Many photos of buildings, landscapes, and other individuals are also included throughout each of the volumes.

To aid researchers, each of the three volumes can be globally searched by selected the "Binoculars Icon" on Adobe Reader's menu bar, or by pressing "Shift CTRL F" on the keyboard. Such a search may well reveal a person of interest in one of the featured biographies – for example, a farmer mentioning the name of a teacher who taught him many years ago. Interesting revelations may await.

Web Wanderings

State Records NSW - new website

State Records NSW has launched a new website which includes a new search

engine for their collections. Researchers will now be able to do a single, simple search to discover photographic and documentary content from amongst the Collection. Note that the online indexes are still accessible via the new website but have not yet been migrated to the new system. This will be an ongoing process over time; however, they will ultimately all be accessible from the single search engine. For more information on using the new website click here.

The Prosecution Project

This project is investigating the history of the criminal trial in Australia. It will also tell us much about Australian history – how people lived, how they behaved, how they dealt with conflict and tragedy, how legal and political institutions responded to crime and its consequences. Scotland's Register of Corrected Entries

Scotland's system of civil registration is different from the English system, and one of the differences is the Register of Corrected Entries. Recently ScotlandsPeople published a helpful guide to this register, which shows many examples, You can find it here

Stories of the Somme

To commemorate the start of the Battle of the Somme on 1 July 1916, the National Records of Scotland (NRS) and ScotlandsPeople have been exploring the unique records that you can search when tracing your First World War ancestors. You can read about the lives of eight soldiers who died on the first day.

In the <u>first article</u>, you can read the stories of two soldiers who served in the 15th Battalion, Royal Scots. In the <u>second article</u>, you can learn about the short lives of six soldiers - both in peacetime and wartime.

Early Irish Marriage Index reaches 80,000 records

The Irish Genealogical Research Society's Early Irish Marriage Index has now been updated, with several thousand more records being added, all noted from obscure and under-used sources. The database now holds reference to more than 80,000 marriages. Combining the names of brides, grooms with the various relatives mentioned in the database, the Marriage Index now notes almost 177,000 named individuals. Welsh Almanac Collection online

The National Library of Wales has digitised and placed online a large collection of almanacs. An almanac is an annual publication that includes information such as weather forecasts, farmers' planting dates, tide tables, and tabular information often arranged according to the calendar. If you have Welsh ancestry and if you also read Welsh, you will want to look at the Welsh Almanac Collection here

Early Rhode Island Court Records now available online

The Rhode Island Historical Society has launched the digital archive "Colonial Justice: Preserving and Digitising Early Rhode Island Court Records." These specific collections were selected for digitisation based on their rarity, as well as their unique documentation of the colonial justice system in Rhode Island.

Users can now access selected 1729-1812 records from the courts of Providence County, Kent County, and what was known as Kings County (now Washington County). The online archive is free. The Court Records are available to search here

The Freedmen's Bureau Project

A project to index the records of 4 million freed African-American slaves is now complete and available online. The Freedmen's Bureau Project has uncovered the names of nearly 1.8 million of some 4 million pre-Civil War era slaves. Enjoy searching here.

Staten Island Historical Newspapers now online

More than 9,000 pages from The Richmond County Advance have been posted online, covering the years 1886 to 1910. Find them here You can read more about this new collection here

Newly Available Online: Marriage Notices appearing in Troy, New York Newspapers 1797 – 1860

An index to 6,177 marriage notices covering 12,354 names that were published in five different Troy, New York newspapers from 1797 to 1860 has been created. Go here Click on 'Projects' and then, under 'Marriage Records', click on 'Marriage Notices Appearing in Troy Newspapers'.

Episcopal Diocese of Utah Database of indexed Parish Records is now online

This initial database covers the years 1870 to 1975. The database contains 4,163 line item entries covering Baptisms, Confirmations, Marriages, Burials, Communicant members, Clergy, services held, and in Archdeacon Ridgley's case. "persons to be visited". The index may be found here

Virginia Tech's Civil War Newspaper Collection is online

The American Civil War Newspapers website can be a valuable resource for genealogists researching Civil War era ancestors. The site is available free of charge and is searchable by keyword. Each page provides options for downloading and viewing printable digital images of the newspaper columns in which a search finds a hit, and also to browse the pages throughout an issue. CanadianHeadstones.com now exceeds 1.5 million records

CanadianHeadstones.com (CH) was founded in 2009 as a completely free archive of headstone photographs. CH is the only fully Canadian site which indexes every name on the headstones, provides the complete transcription and is fully searchable on multiple levels including the text of the transcription. The National Archives of Australia is moving

The National Archives of Australia is moving the Canberra-based collection and some of its audio visual collection from Sydney to a new preservation and storage facility currently being constructed in Canberra. This relocation of some 15 million items will commence in November 2016 and continue through until 30 June 2017. During this period access to the National Archives' collection based in Canberra and some audio visual material from Sydney will be disrupted. There will be periods when it is not possible for the Archives to provide access to records within the timeframes of its Service Charter. Access to Archives records online or those held in National Archives state and territory offices will not be affected.

A Short Film of Jamaica Street in Glasgow In 1901

This wonderful, short film of Jamaica Street in Glasgow in 1901 may interest you. It offers a fascinating glimpse of the city's past. The fact that 1901 is also a census year makes it even more of a rare treasure for researchers who are tracing Glaswegian ancestors from that era. It's also very interesting to see how much traffic there was on the roads! Check it out here

Brexit fuels Increased online Irish ancestry searches seeking information about Irish passport applications

Anyone born on the island of Ireland before 1 January 2005 or whose parents are Irish automatically qualifies for Irish citizenship. In some cases, those who have an Irish grandparent can also apply. The recent Brexit vote apparently is encouraging many people to consider applying for an Irish passport.

Ancestry.com has reported a 40% surge in new trial memberships in the week since the UK voted to leave the European Union, with daily searches of the site's Irish records up by 20%. Some Northern Ireland Post Offices ran out of Irish passport applications in the wake of the referendum result. You can read more in an article here

Photographs of men who fought in the Revolutionary War

Yes - photographs of Americans who fought in the Revolution are exceptionally rare because few of them lived until the dawn of practical photography in the early 1840s. You can view some early photographs (known as daguerreotypes) of the veterans here.

The search for Marilyn Monroe's Scottish ancestors

Another ongoing mystery concerns the attempt to trace the Scottish ancestors of

Marilyn Monroe. This **project** is being run by Clan Munro Society USA and was launched on 1 June 2016, which would have been the 90th birthday of the actress. The story goes that Marilyn's Scottish ancestor was perhaps a Highland soldier who was banished to America in the 1650s. In an attempt to solve the mystery, the Society is offering free DNA test kits to Munro men of Highland origin. Read more here

Ancestry.com is used to catch a Florida man living under an assumed name for more than 20 years

Terry Jude Symansky was a Florida man who drowned in 1991 at age 33. However, his nephew recently was working on a family genealogy project and found his uncle's information on Ancestry.com. Knowing the uncle died in 1991, the nephew was shocked to find a later marriage licence associated with his name. After some investigation, police found that the new Terry Jude Symansky is actually Richard Hoagland, a man who disappeared from Indiana about 25 years ago and was declared dead in 2003.
