Celebrating the 100th anniversary of Mitchelton State School

22 October 2016

QFHS members Dorothy Jeffrey, Rosemary Kopittke and Eric Kopittke attended the Mitchelton State School centenary celebrations. The Publications group had prepared a CD on which were indexes of the available admission registers for the Infants and State School - listing admissions in alphabetical and register order as a series of linked PDF files. The index covers the period to 1997 when digital registers were introduced. Unfortunately, the registers for the years 1933 to 1951 have not been located and so those students are not included in this index.

Topographic and cadastral maps of Queensland

Presenter: Bill Kitson



Bill Kitson will present a session on topographic and cadastral maps of Queensland. Divided into two parts, his talk will cover Topographic Mapping in Queensland 1839 to 1970 and Cadastral Mapping in Queensland 1839 to 1970. Topographical maps indicate land contours, rivers, land forms, etc. and cadastral maps show extent, value, and ownership of land. Bill Kitson a highly respected spatial historian and is one of Queensland's best known surveyors. Bill became interested in researching the lives and work of the men that mapped Queensland following a 1974 Survey Office investigation of the surviving markers along the Queensland State borders. In 1980, he was appointed as curator of the then newly established Lands, Mapping, and Surveying Museum. Register online Bill continues to share the history of mapping and surveying in Queensland. His passion for preserving surveying heritage and his generosity in sharing his knowledge of the spatial industry is unsurpassed.

Session 2: Overview of websites to make the most of Google, the internet, and social media.


Session 3: Making the most of libraries and archives both in Australia and overseas.

National Archives Preservation Facility in Canberra

The relocation of records to the NAPF in Canberra is an exciting evolution for the Archives. The architecturally designed, environmentally sustainable building has storage for approximately 25 per cent of its extensive collection. It will house 104 kilometres of paper records, more than nine kilometres of audio-visual records and a digital archive, ensuring the preservation and conservation of the irreplaceable collection continues into the future.

There will be disruption to access to the Canberra-based collection from **30 October 2016 to 1 July 2017** as they relocate 15 million records from multiple repositories and rehouse them in the NAPF.

Green's Dictionary of Slang contains nearly 100,000 words supported by over 400,000 citations that go all the way back to the middle ages. The dictionary is now available online



Book Review



Our aim in writing up our family history is to produce a work which is readable and enjoyable but also informative. Those with early Brisbane forebears might consider weaving indigenous life into the narrative. It is here that we could well hit the brick wall. Prior to 1824 the Brisbane area was well populated with indigenous campsites to be found in some areas even up to the 1950's. Despite this there is little written on such settlements and we may rely on tales which may or may not be accurate.

Dr Ray Kerkhove has remedied this situation with *Aboriginal Campsites of Greater Brisbane - An Historical Guide.* The publishers state that this is the first book of its kind in Australian History. The book focuses on 15 key settlements in the Greater Brisbane area. There are numerous photographs, many in colour. Each section has a detailed map of the site while the narrative follows a pattern on tradition uses, historical significance and then historical development. The work is sourced in detail.
