QFHS has been publishing research indexes since 1988; to date we have produced 40 CDs. There are currently a number of other projects underway which you may be interested in helping to finalise for publication by proofreading for us.

The 'test' 1969 electoral roll file, which contains a number of introduced, typical 'indexer' errors, will be emailed to you. 

Web Wanderings

Register of immigrants, Toowoomba: 1880 – 1888

This register contains names of immigrants, date of admittance at Toowoomba, name of ship upon which they made the passage to Australia, destination from Toowoomba and date of leaving. Note that many of the immigrants listed in this register originate from Ireland. Go here

Over 14.000 new entries in the Justices of the Peace Index 1857 - 1957

This series was created by the Supreme Court, Moreton Bay, later to become known as the Supreme Court of Queensland and now known as the Supreme Court, Southern District, Brisbane. To date, the years 1857 to 1957 (with gaps) have been indexed. Justices of the Peace are required to sign an oath of allegiance prior to carrying out any duties as justices. Go here

Ryerson Index Update - Searching by Given Name

The Ryerson Index is a free index to death notices appearing in Australian newspapers. The date range covered extends from the Sydney Gazette of 1803 up to newspapers published within the last week or so. The Index also includes many funeral notices, and some probate notices and obituaries. The Ryerson Index is well on the way to 6 million entries, expected some time this year. And it's still free! They have just implemented a given name search – you don't need to have a surname. You can now search on any one of the primary fields, with all other fields available to filter results. Census Find Sheds New Light on St Kilda's (Scotland) History

Not all census records are found online. A few census records have been misplaced over the years. A 250-year-old census came to light during cataloguing by the National Register of Archives for Scotland (NRAS). The census lists 90 people living on the remote archipelago on 15 June 1764 – 38 males and 52 females, including 19 families and nine individuals.

The find is historically important because no one living today was aware of any census records prior to 1822. The new discovery is the oldest known record of the population of St Kilda, a small group of islands about 40 miles west of Benbecula in the Outer Hebrides. Today, the islands are uninhabited. Oklahoma Birth and Death Record Indexes are now Online

Ok2Exploreis a free searchable index of births and deaths that occurred in the state of Oklahoma. Included is limited information on births occurring more than 20 years ago and deaths occurring more than five years ago. The site contains **indexes**, not all the information from these records. Once you have determined that a record of interest is on file, you can apply for a certified copy of that file. The certified copies cost money but do include all available information from the original records. You can access the new *Oklahoma State Vital Records Index here*

North Carolina Publishes a New Online Collection of Tax Records

The North Carolina State Archives has released a new digital collection. The bulk of the records are from the Colonial and Revolutionary War eras, but some lists date from as late as 1853.

Lists sent to the General Assembly are from various counties and give the names of the heads of households and others who were subject to taxation. Horses, cattle, livestock, and other luxury goods such as carriages and coaches are also often referenced. Information about slaves may also be present in these lists. You can learn more here

Pittsburgh, PA Cemetery Records Now Online

Interment.net, is an online cemetery records archive recently added over 668,000 records from 29 cemeteries located in the greater Pittsburgh, PA area. These records have dates of death from the 1750s to present day. You can browse them here

Early Canadiana Online: History and Genealogy Treasures

Early Canadiana Online is a multilingual virtual library of digitised historical publications about Canada, including books, magazines, and government documents, from the 16th to the early 20th century.

Genealogists will find that Early Canadiana Online holds a wealth of resources for Canadian research, including early city and county directories and voters' lists, local and family histories, biographies, and government documents such as civil service and militia registers. Incubation Chambers Help Libraries Save Old Newspapers

The University of Connecticut is undergoing a restoration project to revive 19th century Chilean newspapers. Treasures in the QFHS CD Collection

Educational Sources – Part 1 (Focus: Students)

School and education authority indexes and publications are rich sources of data for family history research. The QFHS Library & Resource Centre has available a sizeable digitised collection of such records. For example, the series of *Qld School Pupil Indexes* [QSPI] (*Vol 1-6*), a selection of *Qld School Admission Registers, The Harrow School Register* (UK, 1801-1893). From the computer network's Main Menu, a keyword search of the *List of CDs* or the Library Catalogue for "school" will reveal these CDs among many others.

The data for the *QSPI* CDs were obtained from a variety of sources, including school admission registers, school histories published in association with school

jubilees and centenary celebrations, as well as from local histories that include lists of pupils at the local school/s. The breadth of information available for any pupil is dependent upon the nature of the source. Admission Registers provide the richest source of data, whereas school and local histories may merely present lists of pupils and the year they were enrolled. Nonetheless, the information provided, however brief, may be enough to provide clues to break down brick walls in your research. The 88 Qld School Admission Registers provide varying data, depending on whether the register is for a primary school, infants' school, state high school, normal school, for example. Generally the registers provide the pupil's name, age, date of admission, religion, the class enrolled in and the child's address. In most instances the name of the enrolling parent, address, and parent's occupation will also be provided. In some instances, the child's birth date will be recorded, but these are not always accurate, particularly in times past where birth certificates were often not produced on enrolment. Registers for State high schools usually provide the name of the previous school, which can be very useful for tracking the locations in which families lived. Note, however, that these documents are images from the original registers, and therefore are not searchable. To use them requires scanning through a school's register until the required record is found.
