

Historical Excursion to North Stradbroke Island

By arrangement with Elizabeth Gondwe of the North Stradbroke Island Historical Museum, QFHS is organising a social outing in the form of an historical excursion to North Stradbroke on Monday, 28 August. We will spend time in the old cemetery at Dunwich and in the North Stradbroke Island Historical Museum. A local bus trip to Point Lookout is also planned.

Excursion agenda on Stradbroke:

10:25am Guided tour of Historical Cemetery at Dunwich plus some history of notable residents

11:25am Depart by bus from Dunwich for Point Lookout (bus trip 20 minutes each way)

12:50pm Depart Point Lookout for return trip to Dunwich

1:15pm North Stradbroke Island Historical Museum. Afternoon tea prior to departure?

3:55pm Depart Dunwich for Cleveland by water taxi

You need to organise your own travel to Cleveland. There is adequate parking

space at Stradbroke Ferries for your car, or you can travel by train to the Cleveland Station where you will be met by a courtesy coach to take you to the water taxi departure point. Those travelling by car could share as much as possible. Cleveland to Dunwich: The Flyer water taxi to Stradbroke departs from Toondah Harbour, Corner of Middle Street and Emmett Drive, Cleveland. Time of departure: 9:55am. Travel time: 25-30 minutes. Disembark at One Mile Jetty, Dunwich at 10:25am.

Dunwich to Cleveland: Depart One Mile Jetty, Yabby Street, Dunwich at 3:55pm. Arrive back at Cleveland at 4:25pm.

Costs are:

- Water taxi (Stradbroke Flyer) return fare: \$19.00 (Pensioner Concession \$9.50).
- Bus Fare Dunwich to Point Lookout and return: \$9.40 return (Concession \$4.60 return).
- Museum tour charge: \$10 per head

Lunch: Bring your own eats and drinks, or buy on the Stradbroke Flyer (can be expensive) or preferably at local Stradbroke stores.



These records might include the digger's service record, unit war diary, Red Cross files, and repatriation files. Paul will also include official histories, maps, and photographs.

Note. If you wish to provide the name and details of a WWI digger for Paul's presentation, an ideal person would be one who was killed or wounded in battle, thus we would Register Online know where that digger was at a certain time. However, you are also welcome to bring details of diggers who were not killed or wounded. Preferably, the digger would be one whose service record has not already been researched.

Gravestone inscriptions for South Mayo

We have added an index to over 50,000 names recorded on gravestones in South Mayo to our website. These have been abstracted from the gravestones collection held at the South Mayo Family Research Centre. The index contains the deceased person's name and graveyard; in many cases the inscription contains the date of death, address and age of the deceased. The time period covered spans most of the 19th and 20th centuries. Go <u>here</u>

Buried in Fingal: a new database for North County Dublin

Here is a huge new online resource for researching Irish family heritage: Fingal County Council has released a new interactive guide called *Buried in Fingal*. The free database includes searchable details of more than 65,000 people interred between 1905 and 2005 in 33 of the burial grounds in the council's care in North County Dublin. The site is searchable by name and graveyard. The oldest burial record dates to 1877 and the most recent to 2013. You can read more here and access this new resource here.

Transatlantic slave trade database details, the largest forced migration in history

Between 1500 and 1866, slave traders forced 12.5 million Africans aboard transatlantic slave vessels. The Trans-Atlantic Slave Trade Database has information on almost 36,000 slaving voyages that forcibly embarked over 10 million Africans for transport to the Americas between the sixteenth and nineteenth centuries. State Library of South Australia's new online portrait collection of "Old Colonists"

If you are descended from one of the early settlers who arrived in Australia prior to 1841, you might be able to find his or her portrait in one of over 1,000 'Old

Most experienced genealogists are familiar with over-sized books. Vital records, deeds, maps, and more are often published on larger-than-normal pages. However, how do you digitise a book that is nearly six feet by seven-and-a-half feet when open? It is so big that it even has wheels fixed onto it to make it easier to move around! The British Library has faced the problem and has digitised the 1660 Klencke Atlas, one of the world's biggest books. You can watch a time-lapse of the multi-day digitisation in a video here.

Treasures in the QFHS CD Collection


The Paracensus of Australia 1788-1828

Were any of your ancestors in Australia during the first forty years of British settlement? If so, have you searched *The Paracensus of Australia*? This CD is available from the "Search by Location – Australia" menu on the computer network in the QFHS Library and Resource Centre.

Published in 2004, the *Paracensus* is a compilation, from various original records, of people who lived in or visited Australia between 1788 and 1828. A list of shipping arrivals during this forty year period is provided, together with the names of 133,000 people. Their names are from, for example, military records; shipping records; convict records; victualling records; baptism, burial and marriage records; court records; the 1828 Census records; as well as from various musters, including the 1818 Van Diemen's Land Stock and Population Muster. The names of some 380 aborigines are also included, as well as the entire crew of La Perouse's expedition, which was in Botany Bay in January 1788. The entries provide, where known, an individual's surname, given names, birth/death year, as well as the ship they arrived in or the location where they settled. The sources from where such information was obtained are also provided.

However, when searching this CD is essential to keep in mind that the data contains many errors and inconsistencies arising from the fragmented and incomplete nature of the original documents. It is recommended that the introductory commentary on how the *Paracensus* was compiled, together with a detailed explanation of the data's short-comings, be taken into account when researching an ancestor mentioned in this document.

Book Review



Susan Mumm, in *Stolen Daughters, Virgin Mothers*, has traced the development of the Anglican sisterhood from its beginnings in 1845 through to 1900. Her research has taken her into the archives of some twenty eight communities whose documents varied enormously in amount and content as well as accessibility. While the sisterhoods have been "covered" in religious history Ms Mumm states that here more emphasis has been given to the clergy associated with these orders. This, she feels, was disproportional to their efforts.

One nun, more than a century ago, said that Men wrote the Tracts for the Times ... while it was women who first carried this theory into practice.

While this topic clearly falls within religious history it must also find a rightful place in women's history. When nuns are mentioned they are often seen as meek and subservient. Munn's work will show that was far from the case. The structure of orders was mostly hierarchical and, therefore, the Superior needed managerial skills and all that entailed. They often had to struggle against clerical "direction" while their nuns were expected to take on very heavy work loads. Mumm believes that a life in a religious order offered a career outside of the normal sphere for Victorian women.
