

Many people from Britain and Europe came to South Australia during the 19th century. Many moved on; some to Queensland and also some to the Northern Territory. The presenter, Dr Kerry Raymond, is a local and family historian, and is the first Wikipedian-in-Residence at the State Library of Queensland.

Forces War Records Offers a New Collection: Pipers of Scottish and Overseas Regiments 1914-18

There is a long history of Bagpipes and the British Army; much of the Army's battles since the mid-1700s had been fought with pipers playing. The original purpose of the pipes in battle was to signal tactical movements to the troops during battle. This collection records all of the men who belonged to these pipe bands during the First World War. Apart from their general military information, this collection notes their fate (if applicable) and a brief outline of how the bands were utilised. Whilst this often states that the band was quickly withdrawn from frontline service – due to their importance with regards to moral, often even no longer being used as stretch bearers. It is quoted that over 1,000 pipers died during WWI. Available via subscription or free at the library here

Presbyterian Church Records Now Available on ScotlandsPeople

More than 36,000 new Presbyterian Church records, covering the period 1744 to 1855 have been added to ScotlandsPeople website. The 20,255 births and baptisms (1744-1855), 10,368 marriages and proclamations (1729-1855) and 5,422 death and burial records (1783-1855) may be especially helpful for anyone searching for a person born or baptised, married or died before the introduction of statutory registration in 1855. In the 2016 census, many Australians provided fake names and withheld their date of birth. A sharp drop in the number of respondents allowing authorities to keep their data archived for 99 years was also noted. In the 2016 Australian census, about one per cent of respondents gave no name or a fake name, while three per cent chose to provide their age instead of date of birth. Details may be found here

Book Review

An Interesting Read from the Lending Library

This is a preview of a book I took out at the Lending Library and I really couldn't put it down as it was so interesting and I learnt about things I didn't think I needed to know.

'Battlefields Then & Now by John Man & Tim Newark' Bar Code 14385 LL L3 4 18

The name of this book caught my eye, as I had just finished reading about Gallipoli. However, it is not just about WWI or WWII, although a few of those battlefields are included. 22 battlefields are described from Alexander the Great in 331 BC to Desert Storm Iraq in 1991 via some from the American Civil War, Zulu and European wars.

It is an easy-to-read account of the methods used, the weather, the landscape, the disasters, blunderings, victories and the men who were involved. Lots of illustrations and maps, and best of all, the battle site as it is today with a transparent sheet showing the battlefield as it was.

It will not help you find an ancestor, but I found it very informative and difficult to put down and it gave me a more vivid insight on what our ancestors lived through during wars. A good historical read, and worthy of time out in our busy world.
