Sugar Exemptions in Queensland 1922 – 1923 data

This series consists of a register kept by the Agriculture and Stock Department of Certificates of Exemptions granted (or refused) to Aliens under the Sugar Cultivation Act of 1913. Under the Act it was unlawful for aliens who had not passed a dictation test to cultivate sugar cane, but regulations allowed for exemptions in certain circumstances. Beyond 2022: Ireland's Virtual Record Treasury

On 30 June 1922, at the outset of the Irish Civil War, a cataclysmic explosion and fire destroyed the Public Record Office of Ireland at the Four Courts, Dublin. Flames and heat consumed seven centuries of Ireland's recorded history, stored in a magnificent six-storey Victorian repository known as the Record Treasury. On the centenary of the 1922 blaze, Beyond 2022 will unveil Ireland's Virtual Record Treasury —a digital reconstruction of the Public Record Office of Ireland building and its collections. New from Findmypast

[Gloucestershire, Bigland's Monumental Inscriptions](#)

Search over 1,500 records of monumental inscriptions recorded in Ralph Bigland's 'Historical, Monumental and Genealogical Collections Relative to the County of Gloucester'.

[Somerset Will Abstracts](#)

Explore six volumes of Rev Frederick Brown's Abstracts of Somersetshire Wills. The volumes were published between 1887 and 1890 although the abstracts themselves cover the 16th, 17th and 18th centuries.

[Hue and Cry Police Gazette Index](#)

Over 63,000 records have been added to our Hue and Cry Police Index. The Gazette was an English newspaper that published notices of wanted criminals and the offences they committed.

Over 400 new records have been added to the Knights of the Realm & Commonwealth index. The index covers 17 different honours and decorations, both current and dormant, and includes records dating back to the 11th century.

Treasures from the QFHS CD collection

- *The Indian Army and Civil Service List*, July 1861. Issued by Order of the Secretary for India in Council. (623 pages)
- *Thacker's Indian Directory*, 1895. (1855 pages)

A recent *Fridays@QFHS* session by Dette Glenday focussed on researching family history in British India. The two recently installed pdf files listed above are relevant to this research, and provide wide-ranging information about India of the day. However, *Thacker's Directory* cannot be searched using Ctrl-F, for example, whereas the 1861 publication is open to word searches. Nonetheless, both have comprehensive content tables, and detailed indexes.

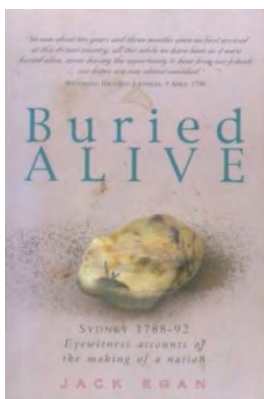
Given the manner in which the British ruled India during the Raj (1858-1947), both books focus on the Bengal, Bombay and Madras presidencies. However, *Thacker's Indian Directory*, in its extended title, makes specific reference to Rangoon, as well as Calcutta, Madras, Bombay, Lahore, Allahabad, and Simla.

The *Indian Army and Civil Service List* of 1861 presents lists of personnel (mainly officers) in the various regiments, both regular and irregular, as well as the names of those who recently died, retired or dismissed, for example. *Thacker's Directory* (1895) includes both military and civil service directories. However, much of this document focuses on commercial interests, including "a complete guide to tea companies, their capital, agents, secretaries, gardens, factory marks, etc.". The directory also presents lists of government pensioners, railway officials, and legal officers, among others. Alphabetic lists of both British "Residents" (336 pages) and "Principal Native Inhabitants" (40 pages) are provided.

These documents can be accessed from the QFHS Library Catalogue by searching for "Miscellaneous Records", or via the *Search by Category* menu and selecting *Miscellaneous Records...*

Book Review



Sometimes I think I would like to have been a fly on the wall in 1788 as Arthur Phillip and those around him struggled to eke out an existence. Jack Egan in *Buried Alive - Sydney 1788-92* offers something similar as the next best thing.

He has gathered from eye witness accounts the story of those first five years. These accounts have been drawn from diaries, letters, journals, and paintings by 28 persons who range from Phillip down to Bennelong and a few lesser known indigenes. The presentation is

chronological.

The paintings cover water color scenes of early Sydney while a detailed map helps to locate the activities. There are pencil portraits of the key players.
