

Findmypast Announces Project to Digitise & Publish 1921 Census of England & Wales

The National Archives in association with the Office for National Statistics (ONS) has awarded leading British & Irish family history website Findmypast the contract to digitise and publish the 1921 Census online

In the most anticipated family history development since the online publication of the 1939 Register, **Findmypast** has been selected as **The National Archives**' commercial partner to make the **1921 Census of England & Wales** available online.

The census, which was the first to be conducted following the introduction of the Census Act of 1920, will be published online by Findmypast in January 2022. The project will see Findmypast capture digital images and transcribe the records in a way that will enable family historians across the globe to conduct meaningful searches of these important records when they are opened for the very first time. Included in the family fun day will be displays of a horse drawn tram, trolley bus, vintage BCC buses, jumping castle for the children and much more for everyone to enjoy.


Gates open from 1pm to 8pm with the official opening by the Deputy Lord Mayor at 3pm. All welcome.

'New Irish Genealogy Resources 2019'

A handy e-book setting out all the Irish family history records released in the last 8 years

Irish Genealogy Toolkit has published a new edition e-book providing brief details of all the brand-new and upgraded Irish genealogy records released in the eight years from January 2011 to March 2019. It's arranged by type of resource ie Census, Newspapers, Military Records etc, and also county-by-county, becoming a handy aide-memoire of recently-available resources useful to Irish family historians.

Book Review



White Rag Burning by Dr Dianne Snowden can be appreciated in three segments – a preference for Van Diemen's land to a desperate Ireland, life in the chosen land and finally the journey's end.

Arson was not unheard of in Ireland but the graphs illustrate a marked spike around 1850 (1848 to 1853). Seeking transportation before the Great Famine was established but there is a definite link between the Famine and the wish to be transported. One might ask why not simply migrate?

Dr Snowden points out the cost involved especially for those already desperately poor. Transportation was the answer and the crime? Arson. Their reasons for the choice of transportation vary but mainly it was to escape grinding poverty, a rising crime rate or to meet up with relatives. In all 248 women were transported for arson.

Convict letters home wrote of Australia in glowing terms. Dr Snowden disabuses this in no uncertain terms. Van Diemen's Land was after all a convict settlement and colonial offences for deliberate arsonists featured a high percentage of incidents as disorderly conduct, insubordination and 'absence'. Women were incarcerated in female factories where, it is said, a subculture formed. Children often had to be sent to the Orphan School when a woman was left destitute.

Dr Snowden states that colonial marriage has been distorted to a large extent by the

failure to recognise common-law marriages. Many *de facto* relationships were long lasting and stable.

Dr Snowden notes that little work has been done on the children of convicts and most of that has been in New South Wales. From *White Rags* the number of deliberate female arsonists having at least one child is about 72% while no evidence of children exists for the other 28%. The creation of families of whatever type was an important part of convict life experience. The work spends considerable time on the various aspects of family. Finally their deaths are an important part of their story but with the paucity of records available many cannot be found or are limited in detail.

White Rags Burning is a very detailed study of an area not often mentioned in general Irish history. While the key element is the crime of arson this is located within a detailed social history account of both Ireland and Van Diemen's land. Forty South Publishing 2018, 235 pages. Indexed, sourced with an extensive bibliography, graphs and photographs. A helpful glossary is also included. Submitted by Pam Masel
