These datasets are in pdf form and can be searched with a simple Ctrl+F. Type in a name and use the up/down arrows to move through the results.

The first collection to be uploaded are *Cemetery Transcripts*. All have been indexed by QFHS so the accuracy is assured. Some have been published on CD, some on microfiche, and others have not been published previously.

Members' Meeting for May


May's meeting is a daytime one commencing at 1pm on Wednesday 15th.



General items of interest



Included in the latest newsletter from SAGS are two items of interest for you, especially the one relating to the recent changes to the reduced information provided on Victorian BDM's.

The Victorian Association of Family History Organisations has released a <u>blog post</u>, recommending that researchers try to consult the CD-ROM and/or microfiche versions of the index before ordering certificates to ensure the correct person is identified.

VAFHO has taken the matter up with the Registry and is encouraging users of the site to raise their concerns directly with the Registry to demonstrate the impact these changes are having on researchers. Go <u>here</u> to read more information.

Web Tips

Foreign language word lists for genealogists

Researchers regularly come across terms that are unfamiliar or in a foreign language. FamilySearch has put together on its <u>wiki</u> a wide range of word lists which give the meanings of about 900 key terms in different languages as well as other vocabulary from genealogical documents.

So if you have uncovered records in another language it might be worth starting here where you can find word lists in languages ranging from Afrikaans to Ukrainian. There is also a general list of abbreviations found in genealogy records such as names, dates, late in and other general terms. Go here

A link to a list of Key Recommended Online Resources has also been added. Most are free to access or search. The list is grouped by record type or topic. Clicking on any title in the list will take you to the associated website or record collection.

If you have Irish in your family tree, these new resources will be of major value in understanding and progressing your Irish research.

Genealogy Hot Tips



Here are a few reminders to help you when you've hit a brick wall or are stumped as to the next step to take in advancing your research.

- 1. Explore name variations remember in times past many people could not read or write and as a result, names had many spelling variations try them all.
- 2. Browse <u>all</u> record collections bearing in mind records can be incorrectly indexed, spelling eg the letter P or B is easily transposed, first and last names may be recorded differently in different collections this can depend on the source document used.
- 3. **New records mean new** more and more records are coming online each month so take the opportunity to go back and search again you never know what you may find. Check "Web Wanderings" for the latest from Ancestry, Find My Past etc.
- 4. Change your focus! Search for siblings. A brother or sister's record may provide the

- missing link. Certainly a great hint when you've hit a brick wall.
- 5. Locate the original record in most cases you may be looking at a transcription from an original record. While every effort is made to ensure accuracy the original may yield more information.
- 6. Don't forget the importance of citing your sources.
- 7. Take advantage of the many classes, webinars and conferences that are available to advance your techniques.
- 8. Attend QFHS Library and Resource centre to make use of the many resources offered to members. You will meet other members who collectively have a wealth of experience and information and are only too willing to share with you.
