



Have you browsed our Lending Library bookshelves lately? Here are a few gems you may like to have a look at when next at the library.

The Life and Death of Ben Hall - You'll Never Take me Alive by Nick Bleszynski LL B6 HAL1

A hero in the great outlaw tradition. Falsely imprisoned for bushranging in New South

Wales in 1862, he declared 'I might as well have the game as the blame.' He bailed up more banks, stations, squatters and towns than any other bushranger and he masterminded the Eurowa escort robbery which netted the biggest haul in the colony's short history.

John Croaker - Convict Embezzler

by John Booker and Russell Craig LL B6CRO 2

After absconding to Calais in 1815 John was convicted of embezzling the proceeds of a bill of exchange and transported to New South Wales for 14 years.

His arrival coincided with the foundation of the Bank of New South Wales where he was employed as a book keeper. He was eventually granted a conditional pardon by Governor Macquarie however, he further developed an interest in brewing which was a failed venture for him.

From 1820 his fortunes declined and in 1823 he left for England and died in mysterious circumstances after a dramatic ship wreck off the coast of Chile.

Dreams of Hope

by Lily O'Connor LL C6 OCO 1

The remarkable memoir of an Irish woman's life from the tenements of Dublin to Luton and Australia.

This book centres on the married life of Lily and her husband Paddy. At its heart is the story of a man who always wanted too much and a woman whose resilience saw coping courageously, often on her own, with a large family under difficult circumstances.

In 1982, Sally travelled back to her grandmother's birthplace. What started out as a tentative search for information about her family turned into an overwhelming emotional and spiritual pilgrimage.

The Ship Thieves

by Sian Rees LL A3 44 20

The amazing tale and unfortunate life of James Power - Australian convict, pirate and master mariner.

Along with 9 others they gained the title of the 'Ship Thieves.'

They chose to face the perils of ocean travel to escape the brutal reality of life as a convict in Van Diemen's Land and hopefully reach Chile.

James had attempted escape many times and when captured the first time was given 100 lashes. After a failed attempt the second time in 1826 he was sentenced to 6 months in chains.

On reaching Chile, they were reported to British authorities, tried and transported to Norfolk Island where conditions were the worst encountered in a lifetime of gaols and

labour camps.
