The **Australian Joint Copying Project** is the culmination of the filming between 1948 and 1997 of Public Record Office documents (including Home Office, Colonial Office and War Office documents and other material from early Australian settlement) and items held in UK, Australian and other libraries.

Ann Swain's talk summarises the AJCP coverage and illustrates its use with two examples from Australia's convict era.

Her talk is especially timely as over the last three years the National Library of Australia has digitised its full collection of films and the documents can now be viewed online from home.

The Digitisation Team have uploaded a further 14,207 names to the QFHS Books – Names Accumulation Index. This makes a total of 37,389 names to research. These names have been extracted from QFHS Family History Book Award and most are early Queensland families or ancestors of those individuals.

Are you exploring all possible options for searching QFHS Online Access? Did you know QFHS has a YouTube account?

The QFHS Technical Advisory Group have been busy and now provide you with two new YouTube videos to assist you get the most from your research online. That brings the total of QFHS videos to six. The first four videos instruct you in the basic use of QFHSdatasearch, whereas the latest two videos are specific to getting the most from your Online Access searching. There are many of us who regard ourselves as visual learners. YouTube is ideal for that purpose.

When in the QFHS Library and Resource Centre what is learned from the QFHS videos can be applied when searching any QFHS produced CD on the computer network, from the Search by Categories menu.

As you know, books in the print library have been for research purposes only, not for borrowing. We are making it easier for you. Some books are being re-catalogued and will be available from the QFHS Lending Library.

writing about their families. The copyright holder for each has provided QFHS with the authority to make them publicly available on the QFHS website. This collection will be expanded as appropriate documents come to hand. Most titles are available to the general public but you will need to login to view others.

Queensland Globe is an interactive mapping website providing access to the spatial information held by the Queensland Government. It is a powerful tool with an extensive array of information that can be overlaid on the maps, but it can be

overwhelming for the beginner.

This hands-on session will be aimed at beginners including: navigating around the Globe, searching for locations by a range of methods, obtaining information about a particular place, and working with the hundreds of built-in data layers (some of which will be included in the presentation).

Some of the limitations of the Qld Globe will also be discussed. Note that Queensland Globe primarily deals with current information rather than historical information.

Registering for Zoom presentations

Just a friendly reminder that your email address is vital when you register for a Zoom presentation. Please double check that you have entered a correct and current email address.

We have had a couple of instances recently where people have missed sessions because they gave the incorrect email address. For instance, instead of an email address <name>@gmail.com, they have put <name>@gmail.com.au.

Often we need to change the Zoom link at the last minute, especially with free events, and if you do not supply a valid email address, you will miss out on any last minute notifications.

Immediately after registering for an event on Eventbrite, you should receive a confirmation email. If you do not receive this confirmation, it may be that the email address you gave was not valid. In fact, you should receive three emails generated by Eventbrite: one immediately after you register, a second two days before the event, and a third shortly before the event begins. The 1939 Register with SmartSearch

The Genealogist has released the 1939 Register transcript, adding search tools and SmartSearch technology. This offers a hugely flexible way to look for your ancestors at the start of the Second World War.

The search options include the ability to find your ancestor in 1939 by using keywords, such as the individual's occupation or their date of birth. You can also search for an address and then jump straight to the household.
