All you need to do is:

- visit www.covid19.qld.gov.au/check-in-qld to download the app from Google Play or Apple App stores
- enter your details once when you first open the app
- open the app when you next visit us
- select 'Check in Now' and scan the sign, near entry door, or enter our code (on sign)

Using this digital check in means your details will be stored securely by the Queensland Government for 56 days to assist with COVID-19 contact tracing (if needed).

Last month we advised that 14,207 names had been added to the **QFHS Books** – **Name Accumulation Index**. This month our indexers have worked hard, and we now add another 15,306 names. That dataset now totals **52,695 entries**. Thanks go to each and every one of you for your contribution.

Each year the Queensland Family History Society presents an Award for the best history of a Queensland family published in book form within the last five years. This master index is compiled from books that have been entered in that competition since the competition commenced in 1993. They contain stories of families from all walks of life and all corner of our great state of Queensland. Do take time to check (no login required) if any of your families are listed. It might just be the link you have been searching for.

A bonus for members is that all Award books are being re-catalogued and are now available to borrow from the **Lending Library**. There are some wonderful stories in these books of early settlers and how they coped with such a harsh environment. If you enjoy reading non-fiction with a family history theme you will enjoy these books.

Queensland Globe is an interactive mapping website providing access to the spatial information held by the Queensland Government. It is a powerful tool with an extensive array of information that can be overlaid on the maps, but it can be overwhelming for the beginner.

This hands-on session will be aimed at beginners including: navigating around the Globe, searching for locations by a range of methods, obtaining information about a particular place, and working with the hundreds of built-in data layers (some of which will be included in the presentation).

Some of the limitations of the Qld Globe will also be discussed. Note that Queensland Globe primarily deals with current information rather than historical information.

Just a friendly reminder that your email address is vital when you register for a Zoom presentation. Please double check that you have entered a correct and current email address.

We have had a couple of instances recently where people have missed sessions because they gave the incorrect email address. For instance, instead of an email address <name>@gmail.com, they have put <name>@gmail.com.au.

Often we need to change the Zoom link at the last minute, especially with free events, and if you do not supply a valid email address, you will miss out on any last minute notifications.

Immediately after registering for an event on Eventbrite, you should receive a confirmation email. If you do not receive this confirmation, it may be that the email address you gave was not valid. In fact, you should receive three emails generated by Eventbrite: one immediately after you register, a second two days before the event, and a third shortly before the event begins. John Grenham's Irish Ancestors available at QFHS

Good news! The QFHS subscription to John Grenham's Irish Ancestors has been renewed for another 12 months.

Full access can only be achieved by attending QFHS, a good reason to visit QFHS library now that it has re-opened.

At home, you can still gain limited access - a soft paywall of about 5 searches a day before being asked to subscribe. Many parts of the website are free.

This is an essential Irish website that should be part of your Irish Genealogy toolbox.



Vast new collection of Australian Passenger Lists

Did your ancestors travel to, from or around Australia? To help you uncover details of their voyage, Findmypast has merged their vast collection of Australian passenger lists into one simple search and added over 9 million new entries.

This growing collection now contains over 26 million of records from multiple sources covering all corners of Australia, including:

- Australian National Passenger Lists 1898-1972
- New South Wales passenger lists (assisted & unassisted)
- 1881 British census crew and passengers on ships arriving in New South Wales
- Queensland customs house shipping passengers and crew 1852-1885
- South Australia passenger lists 1847-1886
- Passengers to South Australia on board Buffalo 1836
- Tasmania Departures 1817-1863
- Victoria inward passenger lists 1839-1923
- Victoria outward passenger lists 1852-1915
- Victoria coastal passenger lists 1852-1924

Each record includes a transcript and many also include an image of the original record. Passenger lists vary widely in size, length, and level of detail, as there was no standardised format.

Middlesex Poor Law Records

Only searchable online at Findmypast, these fascinating records cover 10 Middlesex parishes between 1699 and 1846.

Devon Parish Records

Over 240,000 new parish baptisms, marriages and burials have been added to Findmypast's unrivalled collection of Devon Parish records. Published in partnership with the Devon Family History Society, these new additions are now available to search online for the very first time:

Over 122,000 baptism records (1538-1919 and 1921)

Over 20,000 marriage records (1538-1799 and 1921)

Over 104,000 burial records (1538-1917 and 1921)

The Genealogist's Index of Irish Wills 1484-1858 is an index to surviving

records of Wills, Grants and Administrations, held by The National Archives of Ireland (NAI). Records include the original NAI reference, which can be used to order a copy of the existing document.

To access these and a range of other records log in to QFHS website and select Online Access and then follow instructions to log in to The Genealogist.

This illustrated book tells the story of the day's events, a brief history of the Dayboro railway and the findings of the Court of Inquiry.



"Three Trunks and a Cardboard Case" is a compelling 'creative non-fiction' story about the struggles of an immigrant family in the cane fields of far North Queensland in the 1950s, told from a daughter's perspective. This warmly told story welcomes the reader into the author's family, to share the challenges her parents experienced in emigrating from Sicily, establishing a new home and farm in untamed country, and of her, and her brother's, journey through childhood as they familiarised themselves with the physical and cultural aspects of life in Australia. Overall, the author has written a book that emphatically captures the scenes described, and consequently solidly embeds the story in facts related to family, locality, society and politics of the era."

Three Trunks and a Cardboard Case is being uploaded to the QFHSwebsite as an ebook. It was an entrant in the 2017 Family History Book Award but did not have an index so was relegated to Highly Commended as Memoir. It is a fabulous story, beautifully written, of an early settlers life in Far North Queensland. Even if you have no family from that region, it is a great non-fiction read. There are also 2 copies in the Lending Library.
