Are you using, or thinking of using, "Family Historian" as your family history programme of choice? Are you looking for a comprehensive, easy to use programme to collate and store all of your family history research - data, documents and pictures?

"Family Historian" is a family history programme, developed by UK family historians, for, family historians. It has recently released a major update which has made it bigger and better than ever. For example - imagine filling in a form that looks similar to the original 1891 census form, including all the source details. When completed, "Family Historian" will be updated with:

- any additional people;
- all relevant facts, (census, calculated births if required, birth places, ages, occupations, residences etc.);
- all relevant facts attached to each individual mentioned in the census entry;
- source information;
- an image of the census;
- a census transcription;

Talk about making data capture quick, simple and most importantly, consistent. There are many more features and benefits to make recording and presentation of our research, simple and straight forward. For more info check out the website [here](#).

There is an active user group in the UK who develop addons which further enhance the functionality and usability of the programme, as well as providing assistance to members worldwide. However, I would like to start a local group that can meet and greet at a somewhat more reasonable, local hour.

I see our initial aims as:

- more experienced users assisting newer users;
- more experienced users assisting each other with the more advanced features of the

programme;

- help make family history research and recording enjoyable;
- have enjoyable get-togethers swapping the highs, the lows and the amusing aspects, of family history research.

I would envisage a monthly online get together, beginning with a short presentation on a particular feature of the "Family Historian" programme, then a general Q&A help session. In between these meetings, I would envisage the group would organise a process for members to be able to ask support questions of each other, for those on the fly issues.

These shipping records are the ones from which the data for the two Queensland Customs House Shipping CDs (1852-1885 & 1886-1899) were extracted. Although these are available via both the QFHS Library & Resource Centre's computer network and the QFHS website's Online Access (Datasets by Category), **the Original Records are only available from within the QFHS Library**; from the Search by Category Menu, select Published QFHS CDs – Australasia – Queensland – A-G.

The records presented are arranged by **Year, Ship**, and, for example, **Passenger Departure and Crew & Passenger Arrival**.

One way to use these records is to:

Find the details of arrival or departure using the search facilities on the QFHS website or the QFHS CDs on the computer network, and then

Use the bookmarks in the Contents file to display the original record for the ship of interest.

Member, Carmel Bell, has been delighted to have received an enquiry from a family historian residing in New South Wales who was searching for family in Queensland. Carmel writes

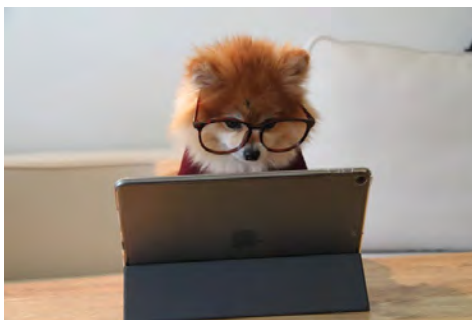

You can take home one of those books if you agree to index it. I.e. read the book and extract the names and page references that you find. Let's say you have a family connection with Bulimba or Bundaberg or even Bullamakanka. You can use the library catalogue to find books that have information on those places or people you are related to and arrange with the digitisation team to take this treasured tome home and do your bit to reveal its contents (via the combined index) to a wider audience.

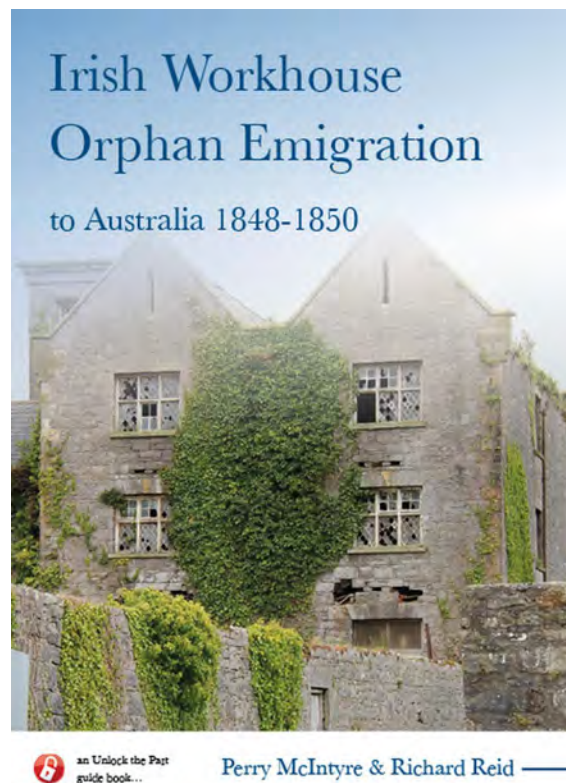

One of the now best-known stories of Irish emigration to Australia is that of the Irish 'orphan girls'. Sent between 1848 and 1850 from union workhouses all over Ireland at the height of the 'Great Famine', their plight has captured the imagination of family historians. To have an Irish orphan in the lineage has become as absorbing as finding a convict once was.

How can an individual orphan's story be unravelled? Only by careful research using what, until recent times, were volumes of Irish workhouse Boards of Guardians minutes, and other related material, literally mouldering away in the cupboards and outhouses of Irish county institutions. Now mostly saved in proper repositories, the information in them about the scheme - the so-called Earl Grey orphan scheme - that brought girls to Adelaide, Port Phillip and Sydney can be linked with British Colonial Office records, Australian immigrant shipping lists, and other arrival material in state archives.

Such research reveals fascinating glimpses of the circumstances and the journey that took an Irish orphan from the poverty of an Irish workhouse to the possibilities of a better life in the colonies.

This publication describes the most important of those records and the sort of individual and contextual information that can be extracted from them.
