A series of talks, workshops, seminars, and information sessions – many of them free - will be held throughout Australia and New Zealand during August in celebration of National Family History Month.



QFHS Vice President, Alex Daw, is the NFHM co-ordinator for the Australasian Federation of Family History Organisations (AFFHO). The speakers Alex had arranged for the NFHM Opening Ceremony spoke on the interesting, exciting and thought-provoking ways Artificial Intelligence (AI) could be and were being used in family history projects, large and small. Like it or not, the future is rushing at us at great speed!

This year, QFHS is celebrating NFHM by highlighting our impressive 'usual' offerings and inviting our local community to join us (see further comment below). The end of August is not far off but there are still some stimulating events on offer. Don't forget to tell friends, family and neighbours that they're welcome to register as a visitor at any of our 'usual' events to learn more about the benefits of QFHS membership and the fascination of Family History research.

The NFHM of August traditionally includes our Open Day and, once again, we have been stymied in our plans for such an event – this time by our inability to identify the building appropriately with signage and complete other tasks we thought essential to opening the premises for inspection and making a good first impression. Thankfully, the reason for that delay has been explained by Brisbane City Council's decision to require the facility be put to tender. BCC advised recently that the tender process for the lease of 46 Delaware Street is now open together with other community facility sites. I feel it's fair to say that the many hours of work contributed by the Management Committee in the first quarter of the year in updating the Society's **Strategic Plan** and by program leaders and the MC leading up to the AGM with the production of a fact-filled **Annual Report 2023** ought stand us in good stead in the tender application process. Both documents amply illustrate the significant extent of our volunteer community, the range and value of services we provide our community - both members and non-members - and our thoughtful planning for a healthy future.

In the normal course of every month from February to December, your Society offers no fewer than eight events open to the general community and flyers advertising the NFHM August events were delivered to over 1000 homes in our neighbourhood. Thank you to the following Library Assistants who took a walk in the neighbourhood to letterbox drop: Marion Atkinson, Denniston Furey, Chris Griffiths, Helen Johnson and Anne MacKay. They were supplemented by Management Committee member, Carmel Bell, who included the task in her 10,000 steps a day regime. We appreciate their assistance to raise awareness in our immediate community of who we are and what we do.

In addition to the (minimum) eight member activities per month we advertised to our community, we have at least four other events that are exclusive to members and provided under the **Members Lounge** banner. Every month, Alex Daw produces a highly informative presentation for *What's New?* Alex includes what's new in the Society (introducing new resources and new volunteers for specific roles) as well as what's new in the family history research world. As with most Members Lounge activities, these sessions are interactive with participants adding value to the activity by sharing their knowledge and expertise.

Thanks to the suggestion from Wendy Angliss (Assistant Treasurer and Co-Convenor of the

Colonial India and Far East Interest SIG) and some website magic from our Web Content updater, Debra Ricks, these presentations will shortly be available on our website <a href="here">here</a>. While the valuable member interactions are not included (for that you'll need to attend), I'm sure you'll find there's something for everyone in Alex's presentations.

We're very pleased to have engaged one of our senior researchers, Sue Reid, for the next *Family History Toolkit* session on **Tuesday 29 August**. Toolkit is designed to assist us develop skills in family history research and this time we're addressing **Negative Evidence** – when that 'facts' aren't laid out nicely in an obituary or immigration record, how do we use what's not apparent or is even missing to find an answer? Sue will instruct and help us develop skills and processes in using Negative Evidence that have the potential to lead us to these discoveries more often and more reliably. **Don't miss out -** register now!

Our Members Lounge Social event for August will be another coffee morning on Monday 28th, this time with the theme of *Stories of the Women in our Families*. We know that women's stories are often difficult to uncover so let's celebrate National Family History Month together by sharing a photo or an artefact and a few facts or deductions about one of the women in your family history. We've decided on a Monday this time so Library Assistants don't miss out due to their commitments to the Family History Research Centre.

We will arrange our seating in small tables & will 'round robin' our way around so we can easily hear each other's shared stories.

We're keen to make solid connections with like-minded organisations and we know many members have links to their local historical societies. If you are one such member, would you be prepared to take on an informal liaison role for QFHS, keeping us informed of activities to which we may contribute? If so, we'd love to hear from you.

We're also interested in forming supportive associations with **smaller family history groups throughout Queensland** so we'd be pleased to hear from you if you are a member of such a group as well as of QFHS. Such liaison roles would not be individually arduous but could be of significant benefit to all groups.

All members are encouraged to attend the upcoming Members General Meeting Wednesday 13 Sept 7.30 - 8.45 pm

This is one of three major reporting events in the life cycle of the Management Committee - the

other two being a Members General Meeting in March and the AGM in June.

The meeting will be held online. Registration is required & may be completed here.

The Draft Agenda is available on the website. To assist the meeting to run efficiently and allow sufficient time to be allocated to notified business, please advise the Management Committee if you would like items added to the agenda.

Finally, we have a wonderful resource at QFHS – our **Print Library**. The Reference Collection and Lending Library of approximately 10,000 items is managed by a team of volunteers who invest many hours a week in their maintenance. The new premises has allowed for the location of this valuable resource in the centre of our space and this has encouraged browsing and the discovery of many 'gems'. We encourage all members to visit the Research Centre and spend some time having a good fossick about in the collection. Of course, conduct searches in vLibrary beforehand to focus your searching but nothing beats a good browse!

In many ways, the Print Library is an artefact of past times when the only way to access information was to visit a library and browse the collection. One of our challenges is to get the contents of the Print Library to our members who cannot readily visit the premises. Bev Young leads a Digitisation Project and team of volunteer indexers who take the content of book indexes and add the names to our **unique digital Datasets** resource – currently at 14 million records. Batches of data – tens of thousands or even hundreds of thousands at a time – are regularly added to the Datasets by various individuals and indexing project groups. All members are encouraged to regularly revisit the Datasets collection and either attend the premises themselves or use the member Look-up Service to request specific information they've identified in the Datasets. The Look-up Request form is on the website here.

If you have suggestions for ways the Reference Collection can be made more accessible to all members, we'd love to hear from you.

Ideas, large and small, would be greatly appreciated.



The Queensland Agricultural Journal was published monthly between 1910 and 1989 by the various Agricultural departments of the Queensland State Government. The journals contain information regarding pest management, farming techniques, stock management, veterinary procedures and general information that was used by farmers (eg. rainfall, market prices, planting schedules, advertisements, soil analyses, fertilizers etc.). This information may be useful to local and family history researchers.
