President's Update

Dear members

It's been another busy and productive month at QFHS. This update barely scratches the surface of all the goings-on!

This month, Rosemary Kopittke and Laurie Lee have been working on the script and visuals for a 15-minute recorded presentation for the UK-based Family History Federation's **REALLY USEFUL Family History Show.** The REALLY USEFUL shows are very popular and in November, will **feature regional and local family history societies**. We are taking the opportunity to present our collections to an international audience – the working title for the recorded piece is **Find Your Family in Queensland.**

Rosemary, a QFHS Fellow and coordinator of the Queensland School Pupils Index project, and Laurie Lee, member of the Technical Advisory Group and our YouTube video expert, have given their knowledge and expertise to the Society so that we may raise our profile in the wider family history community. We thank them both for their time and interest.

We live in an **increasingly visual world** and if we want to attract the attention of a visually savvy audience, we must improve our skills and abilities to do so. Preparing short and spontaneous 'pieces to camera' - nothing as sophisticated or scripted as the product that Rosemary and Laurie are working on – will become more prevalent for us in other spheres within the Society. We humans are social animals – we like to join in with others and do what others are doing. If there is proof that others are enthusiastic, we tend to think 'hmm, I think I'd like that, too'. As family historians, we are often at peak enthusiasm when we learn new information or gather a tip or two during a SIG meeting. Learning to capture that enthusiasm in a short video to be posted to Facebook or other social media or to our website homepage will enliven those mediums and demonstrate to others that what we do is fun and rewarding. It will stimulate interest.

With this in mind, the Management Committee has endorsed Vice President Alex Daw's initiative to make training available to, in the first instance, those who convene SIGs, present education sessions, and/or speak to community groups about QFHS. The aim is to build skills and confidence in speaking to camera, and to learn ways of presenting information in an engaging manner. Thank you for this initiative, Alex, and thank you also to those who, despite the challenges that such learning will present, have accepted the offer to invest in their in their development for the Society's benefit.

A hot topic of discussion lately has been the nature of the **programs we will offer members in 2024**. What has worked in 2023? What can we improve? And what can we do more of in 2024? Discussions are continuing but it is apparent that we could certainly do more if we had more team members contributing to ideas and collaborating with their development.

By **volunteering with our Education Team**, you have the chance to make a meaningful impact. Whether you have experience in event planning, technological proficiency, or simply a passion for family history, your skills and dedication can contribute to our community. We have hosted the fourth and final Library Assistant Consultation and Training session for the year. We always learn a lot from our LAs and many have commented how beneficial they find the opportunity to meet with Alex and me to learn first-hand what's happening in the Society and to share ideas. As our front-line ambassadors, we depend on our Library Assistants' knowledge and interest in providing quality assistance to members and visitors. Thank you to Dette Glenday for managing the LA roster and keeping the LA Manual up to date so our Library Assistants have important information at their fingertips.

There's been no news yet about the tender for the lease of 46 Delaware Street, but we have undergone a Fire Safety Audit. Thanks to the fire safety training conducted by Greg Crawford earlier in the year and the records and procedures he developed for us – in addition to the Emergency Management Plan he produced for MC approval - QFHS was able to meet the Fire Safety Audit requirements. Of course, an audit always finds a 't' that's not crossed or an 'i' that's not dotted (I suspect Greg may have purposefully omitted some of these to 'make their day') but we are grateful to Greg for positioning QFHS to meet the Audit requirements. Any deficiencies will be addressed. Hint: members visiting the premises should be prepared to practice Emergency Evacuations of the building.

Queensland School Pupils Index Part 7

319,500 new records added 29 September 2023

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A further 319,500 entries have just been added to the online Queensland School Pupils Index Part 7 database. The additional data includes names from 173 schools – all from admission registers. The schools include both large and small from across Queensland – including a number of very large schools such as Caboolture SS, Caloundra SHS, Harristown SS, Hermit Park SS, Holland Park SS, Kirwan SHS, and Nambour SHS. There are also many small to very small schools such as Alice Creek SS, Aloomba SS, Charters Towers School of the Air, Darling Point Special School, Rise and Shine SS, Ubobo SS, Warooby SS, and Wyaralong SS. Also included is the Wacol East SS for New Australians which opened in 1949 and closed in 1963.

As with all the schools in the QSPI collection, some of these schools include adult students not just those we might usually expect to find. Be aware also that some students appear multiple times for the same school because a decision was made to partially rewrite and/or renumber the entries. It is definitely worth looking at all the entries for each student.

What's Online



Our online resources keep growing

If you haven't found time this year to explore our on-line resources the summer break might be the perfect time to run some keyword searches. Consider these data collections and indexes which have been updated or added in 2023.

- QFHS Books: Name Accumulation Index.
- Queensland Schools Pupils Index Part 7
- Orphanage Admissions 1865 1909

The following datasets are very comprehensive and might just throw up that piece of evidence that you are looking for:

- Commonwealth Electoral Roll (Queensland) 1903, 1906,1913, 1922, 1934, 1941, 1949,1959,1969
- Early Queensland Electoral Rolls 1860-1884 and 1889
- Queensland Customs House Shipping 1852-1899: Passengers and Crew

Queensland Schools Past and Present

This database provides information on 5,118 Queensland schools both past and present. It includes schools across the spectrum of all that exist or have existed in Queensland: vested schools, non-vested schools, national schools, government schools (provisional and state schools), and private schools.

For each school the database provides:

- School name and number: each government school was assigned a number when it opened. Often numbers were reused after schools closed.
- Initial opening date: many of the schools opened and closed multiple times. Only the initial opening date is recorded.
- Final closing date: many of the schools opened and closed multiple times. Only the final closing date is recorded.
- Additional information: includes name and status changes, information regarding closing and reopening. The term 'mothballed' is used to describe schools that are effectively closed but where assets are maintained in case the school becomes viable again.
- Location: a guide to the location of the school. Many schools were only open for only a very short time and in some cases it was difficult to determine their exact location.
- Postcode: either the current postcode of the town or that of a nearby town.
- 2009 Education District: to assist in the location of the school.
- Known published sources available: includes published books. The list of books published is not exhaustive.
- Reference sources: sources used in the compilation of this database. i.e.
 Queensland State Archives, Queensland Education Department, Queensland Education Office Gazette.
