Management Committee Update August 2025

Appointment to Management Committee

Our Volunteer Coordinator Jenni Doolan was appointed to the management committee to complete its compliment of 10 for the current term. Jenni assists with our day to day operations along with her Volunteer Coordinator role duties. Welcome Jenni.

Open Day

Plans for this event continue to come together. The coming weeks will increase the tempo of our activities. A brief opening ceremony will take place about 11am on the day. Danita Parry, our local councillor, has accepted an invitation to open the event. Our Open Day fence sign has been updated to be on display from 16th August on our front entry fence.

Safer Suburbs Grant

We used our grant to improve our security lighting. Lyndal and I attended a function in City Hall on 6th August along with the other recipients of the grant. Our Lord Mayor indicated continuing grant support for organisations providing a public service to Brisbane. Peter Gehrke is finalising the acquittal documentation for BCC to complete this exercise.

Book Award 6th August at Aspley Hornets

Clem chaired the event which was well received. Four books were presented, and an entertaining and informative discussion was the order of the day. The winner was Catherine Smith-Henrichs with her entry entitled *The Sugar King*. Several of the entries this year were centred around FNQ sugar farming pioneers. Thanks Clem and your judging team for another sterling effort with this annual event.

Property Update

We have lodged our application for the external site sign and are awaiting the council's decision. We are working with our facilities team on completing an application for approval to install the new front door and portico. We have still some way to go, but quotes are now updated. At the BCC's recommendation we are having discussions relating to how we divert the excess rainwater away from the front door area. Once a more definite plan is agreed upon, a plumber will be invited to provide us with a quote. Once a plumbing design has been agreed upon, and quoted on, a work application can be lodged with BCC.

Anika Wells' Departmental grant

The grant application has been successful for an amount of \$14,535.00 net of GST. Our IT team are working on identifying a server unit which was the purpose of this grant application. Once installed this might well kick start the remainder of our IT upgrade.

Acquisitions guidelines

Guidelines have been approved and are posted in dropbox. Alison Gardiner has agreed to be the Acquisitions Co-ordinator and will be the person to contact moving forward with acquisition matters. The Acquisition Request Form can be located on our website in the members portal. Thank you to the library team for all of their assistance in developing these guidelines etc and welcome aboard Alison and thank you for your offer to coordinate this task for us.

Volunteers

A number of vacancies remain in our volunteer ranks. Members are urged to seriously consider where you might be able to assist our Society. As our Society exists on our volunteers, should we continue to have a paucity of volunteers we may well be forced to review the activities short of personnel.

Speakers Tour in August/September 2026

A national tour is proposed next year featuring Blaine Bettinger (DNA and AI) and Simon Davies (WeAre.xyz) as the keynote speakers. We have agreed to jointly organise the Queensland event with GSQ, sharing the organisation, the costs and the profits.

QFHS Research Kiosk

Some words by Barry Koster

Diane Coster, as a member of the Print Library team, had for many years expressed a frustration to method journals was a resource that was available but not easily located. V Library only stored a title or a header but the database did not store detailed information on all issues held by the Society.

Most current journals arrive as a searchable PDF so these are loaded on a weekly basis and older paper journals are being scanned to convert them to searchable PDFs. Some books have also been scanned and made into searchable PDFs.

This configuration and capability saw the computer become affectionately known as the "Kiosk".

The Kiosk, which is constantly being added to, is not connected to the Internet and only holds PDFs that have been sourced from within the QFHS Library.

Its point of difference is that in most cases there is no focus on a particular journal or book title. The approach is merely to enter a name, place, event or a combination of those and let the Kiosk find what files hold relevance to your search.

While not imperative for searching, the Kiosk has PDFs stored in themed libraries or catalogues. If looking for results in Ireland, you may chose not to search in other places such as the Queensland Police Gazette.

Carolyn Grimward is the liaison person for those wanting assistance in the use of the Kiosk. Carolyn also does searching for those members who are not able to attend the Library and contact via the instruction in the Research Service under Quick Links on the Society's home page. The Kiosk has been evolving since March 2024 and Carolyn has replied to 28 requests with 212 positive responses in that time. As members become more familiar with what the Kiosk can add to their searches it is anticipated that the number of requests and the number of members who will be able to use the resource will grow.

Currently we have 7,285 PDFs with 1,822,407 pages indexed for searching. Most searches take seconds to produce a result.

Sir Augustus Charles Gregory KCMG, MLA, FRGS, DistGM, was an iconic Australian explorer, exemplary citizen and notable Freemason (born 1 August 1819 Farnsfield, Nottinghamshire, England; died 25 June 1905 Brisbane, Queensland, Australia).

The life of this extraordinary man will be covered in three tranches, viz.

- Explorer on the Australian Plateau
- Early Queensland State Administrator and Community Leader
- Patriarch of Queensland Freemasonry.

He has been referred to as the 'Bradman of Australian Explorers' but few today have heard of him. He was also Queensland's first Surveyor General and Land Commissioner in 1859.

New Materials Available on FamilySearch

FamilySearch International is the largest genealogy organisation in the world. It is based in Salt Lake City, USA.

In June 2025, FamilySearch expanded its free online collections by gaining access to more than 30 million new records from 8 countries. Some of the exciting new additions include 16 million Italian birth, marriage, and death records (civil registrations, 1804 to 1943), 5 million Brazilian cemetery records (1799 to 2024), and nearly 1 million records from the American Medical Association (AMA) of deceased physicians (1864 to 1968). See the full list of collection updates in the FamilySearch Newsroom.

Other countries with significant record additions in June include the following: Belgium, Colombia, Ecuador, France, and Ukraine.

FamilySearch continues to add millions of new records each week to its online collections from countries

around the globe. Today, more than 20 billion historical records and images can be searched freely at <u>FamilySearch.org</u>.

At present, the museum is working on the restoration of the historic Penguin lugger to seaworthy condition as a proud symbol of Queensland and Torres Strait maritime heritage—ensuring its legacy endures. The goal is for the Penguin to sail again as a source of learning, connection, and pride—sharing maritime skills, celebrating multicultural heritage, strengthening community bonds, and bringing people together at the Queensland Maritime Museum and on the Brisbane River. Les Moreland Scrapbook Index

There are 6,984 entries in the Les Moreland Scrapbook index, many from German sources. These point into a collection of 2,284 PDF files (not images). Some of the PDFs are excellent but other photocopies, done in the 1980s and 1990s, are not particularly clear.

This collection offers an index of deceased or officially missing people from various French departments, spanning 80 years of history. It includes 26 million records, with high quality scanned images.

For the past several years, we have chosen an illustrated cover from *The Queenslander* to add to the header for Snippets.

The Queenslander was launched by the Brisbane Newspaper Company in 1866 and discontinued in 1939. It was the weekly summary and literary edition of the *Brisbane Courier*, the leading journal in the colony - and, from 1859, the State of Queensland.

With weekly publication spanning 60+ years, there were many (out-of-copyright) images to consider as a header for Snippets.
