Management Committee Update September 2025

Open Day

Thank you to many of our members for your assistance on the Open Day which encompassed a wide range of interests, displays, and activities. Our event was supported with about 50 visitors at our centre during the day. A brief opening ceremony was conducted with Ward Councillor Danita Parry who spent about an hour with us. A pleasant atmosphere prevailed all day and members and guests appeared to enjoy the day. Consideration is being given to pencilling it into our calendar as repeat event in August 2026. 17 of the visitors joined as members and 3 past members rejoined.

Finance

Our finances continue to operate at a comfortable level, aided in August by receipt of Investment income and receipt of the Anika Wells Dept grant.

Safer Suburbs Grant

We are finalising the acquittal documentation for BCC to complete this exercise which provided us with better security lighting.

Property Update

We lodged our application for the external site sign some weeks ago now. A recent follow up with our BCC liaison officer indicated the matter was still under consideration. A work application to BCC for the installation of our new front door and the weather awning (portico) was lodged 10/9/25.

Our TAG team is working on the server specifications suitable for QFHS going forward. We have received the formal grant documentation which appears to be the usual standard format for such funding.

Peter Gehrke is working on applications for the Gambling Grant and also a BCC grant scheme both of which close late in October. Purchases encompass IT hardware required to enhance our new server capabilities and update our operating system platform.



New Materials available on FamilySearch

FamilySearch International is the largest genealogy organisation in the world. It is based in Salt Lake City, USA.

In June 2025, FamilySearch expanded its free online collections by gaining access to more than 30 million new records from 8 countries. Some of the exciting new additions include 16 million Italian birth, marriage, and death records (civil registrations, 1804 to 1943), 5 million Brazil cemetery records (1799 to 2024), and nearly 1 million records from the American Medical Association (AMA) of deceased physicians (1864 to 1968). See the full list of collection updates in the FamilySearch Newsroom.

Other countries with significant record additions in June include the following: Belgium, Colombia, Ecuador, France, and Ukraine.

FamilySearch continues to add millions of new records each week to its online collections from countries around the globe. Today, more than 20 billion historical records and images can be searched freely at FamilySearch.org.

Les Moreland Scrapbook Index

There are 6,984 entries in the Les Moreland Scrapbook index, many from German sources. These point into a collection of 2,284 PDF files (not images). Some of the PDFs are excellent but other photocopies, done in the 1980s and 1990s, are not particularly clear.

MyHeritage's French historical record collection



MyHeritage offers an important historical record collection: France, Tables of Successions and Absences, 1890–1970. This collection offers an index of deceased or officially missing people from various French departments, spanning 80 years of history. It includes 26 million records, with high quality scanned images.

The Queenslander was launched by the Brisbane Newspaper Company in 1866 and discontinued in 1939. It was the weekly summary and literary edition of the *Brisbane Courier*, the leading journal in the colony - and, from 1859, the State of Queensland.

With weekly publication spanning 60+ years, there were many (out-of-copyright) images to consider as a header for Snippets.
