QFHS Management Committee Meetings

Constitution Update;

Our constitution has been approved by the Office of Fair Trading. A huge thank you to Char for all of her work over a lengthy period. Thanks to Chris Shuetz and Kevin Haley for their contributions to the constitution sub committee.

Centre update;

Tiling update; We hold BCC work approval to tile the kitchen. Application to BCC for work approval has been lodged to tile the male and female toilets. MC has agreed to apply for a BCC grant to finance these projects. The cost of waterproofing the front wall influenced the change of funding ideas. BCC Grant opened 23/3/26 and Peter Gehrke is working on this. Jenni is arranging delivery of the tiles involved in readiness for that work to be undertaken when circumstances permit.

Plans are in hand to complete the drainage of the down pipes from our new awning away from our building in the cooler months. Chris Gibbs is liaising with a painter to waterproof the front wall. Gutter guard is also to be installed on our new awning when the next gutter service occurs and a quote for the job is held.

Recent incidents involving our front door have initiated the reintroduction of having a spare key in the key lock box.

Library proposed alterations;

The MC has taken the decision to move on with this rearrangement. We shall leave the

kitchen floor in its current state. Items against the back wall in the maps area will be moved to a new location in the centre and not into the kitchen area as initially planned, this change should save a double shift of these items when tiling occurs. Shelving will be ordered, our library team will be requested to provide a plan for the book rearrangement. The physical movement of books will involve professional removal services.

Building Maintenance Register;

All checks to 31/03/26 have been attended to and duly recorded in our register maintained by our Facilities team..

Grants;

Peter Gehrke is working on a BCC grant application for our tiling project. We were successful with our Gambling grant application for \$16,500 to replace 12 PCs, screens and accessories at the centre. Our TAG team are now working on suitable specification for each of the new units. Peter has finalised the server grant as the unit is now fully operational.

2026 Speaking Tour;

In view of the current world situation including the oil issue impact on world economies and costs in general we have opted out of the tour. The MC considered the prevailing economic conditions and its impact on business and personal finances indicated now was not the right time to become involved in this tour.

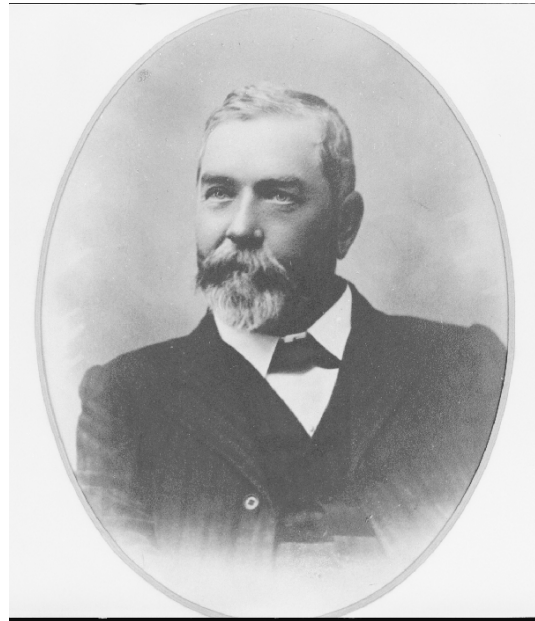

QFHS Members Lounge Book Club Meeting 23 February 2026

Anita Heiss - *Dirrayawadha* (Rise Up)

Anita greeted us with, 'Marang ngarin', -- G'day in Wiradyuri.

We discussed the meaning of 'colonisation', before Anita expanded on the context, history and significance of her book. It examines the invasion and colonial history of the Bathurst region, the Declaration of Martial Law in 1824, and the ensuing disastrous consequences before Windradyne takes action to secure a peace agreement with the authorities. It is also a love story : of family, country, and between Mina and the Irishman Dan. Anita believes *Dirrayawadha* is her most important piece of writing. She said it was distressing both to research and to write and was published against the background of the defeated 2023 Australian Indigenous Voice referendum and the horrors of Israel's war with Gaza.

Alex Daw again did a wonderful job as convenor, saying, 'Anita, you are a legend and so generous to share your time with us.'

Carmel added, 'Anita, your language flows beautifully from you.'

Leesa, a first-time attendee, said she learnt a little while ago that Indigenous adults are enrolling in/returning to higher education at greater rates than non-Indigenous peoples. Interesting. Linda was also with the group for the first time and added valuable insights.

More of Queensland history will become available with The Queensland State Archives new partnership with Ancestry. QSA cares for around 3.8 million records documenting Queensland's past. While many have already been digitised, the majority of the collection is still only accessible onsite.

Working with Ancestry will allow more of these records to be made accessible online, both on the [Ancestry.com](#) website—which is free to access in QSA's Reading Room in Runcorn—and via ArchivesSearch, QSA's catalogue.

An Ancestry team member is now working onsite at QSA to digitise selected material, starting with historic local government rate books.

QSA looks forward to sharing more of Queensland's history with researchers across the state, the country and beyond.

Queensland School Pupils Index

Queensland School Pupils Index Part 7 has just had an additional 415,213 names uploaded from 183 school admission registers. If you are wanting to know which the new schools are then check out the "List of schools" and search for those that have "(new)" included in their description. Use the index and then chase up the original register entry at the archives. The extra details will help break down many brick walls.

The new entries take the total for QSPI Part 7 to over 3.5 million entries and our overall

count of school records to almost 6 million. They are an exceedingly valuable resource for researching your Queensland families.

The Queenslander was launched by the Brisbane Newspaper Company in 1866 and discontinued in 1939. It was the weekly summary and literary edition of the *Brisbane Courier*, the leading journal in the colony - and, from 1859, the State of Queensland.

With weekly publication spanning 60+ years, there were many (out-of-copyright) images to consider as a header for Snippets.
