New Index to the North Nottinghamshire Register of Voters, 1885

Last year, Ancestry.co.uk launched images of the North Nottinghamshire Register of

Voters for 1885. However, there was no index at that time. The register has now been updated with an index, meaning it is now possible for users to search the records.

These registers list the names of North Nottingham residents who were eligible to vote in elections in 1885. Included are the voter's name, place of abode, type of property that qualified him, and location of the property. This may be the same as the place of abode, or it may be a rental or some other property. Names of tenants or landlords may also be included. The index is free to the genealogical community, although access to images of the records requires a paid membership. Available for free at the QFHS library.

Scottish Property Valuation Rolls for 1895 go Online

The names of more than two million Scots from 1895, with records of Scottish properties and their owners and occupiers have been released on ScotlandsPeople, the government's family history website. Available via subscription at: http://www.scotlandspeople.gov.uk/

The National Library of Wales has Announced a Pioneering Decision

The National Library of Wales has announced a pioneering decision in relation to its digitised collections by declaring that it will no longer claim ownership of copyright in digital copies of items in its care. For many years, the Library has been proactive in its use of digitisation and the Web as means of widening access to its collections. From Wales's earliest manuscripts to countless volumes of nineteenth-century Welsh newspapers, the Library has digitised and published copies of some of its most valued collections for all to see on the Web, anywhere and anytime. These include:

- The Black Book of Carmarthen (ca. 1250)
- Yny lhyvyr Hwnn (1546)
- Thomas Taylor's county atlas (1718)
- Welsh Newspapers Online

National Library of Wales Identifies Fire-Damaged Archives

The National Library of Wales has identified some of the items damaged or destroyed in a fire caused accidentally by workers using a blowtorch. Archive material which was smoke or water damaged beyond repair included papers relating to Welsh football and the Wales Green Party. The cost of repairs to the Aberystwyth library is expected to be up to £5m. Some 140 crates of material were badly damaged by water and smoke. Read more at: http://bbc.in/14dHAOC

FamilySearch Obtains Permission to Digitise Vital Records in France

FamilySearch, has now obtained permission to digitise images of records about persons born more than one hundred and twenty years ago, as recorded in French civil acts.

FamilySearch already has a collection of microfilm images of vital records and church records obtained under an agreement reached in 1960 with Archives France. However, that agreement did not include permission to publish images on the still-to-be-invented Internet. In recent years, FamilySearch has asked for permission to publish the images online and that permission apparently has now been granted.

Free Guide to Pennsylvania Ancestors

The Family History Library staff have now completed a project to improve the Pennsylvania section of FamilySearch Wiki. Special emphasis has been placed on the county pages. Users will find lots of links to online church records, naturalisations, and wills.

In this guide, you will find a series of research articles packed with helpful ideas for tracing ancestors in big cities like Philadelphia and Pittsburgh, as well as 67 counties throughout the state. Pennsylvania Online Genealogy Records will help you quickly discover what is available online. In Pennsylvania, birth, marriage, and death records generally do not begin until the late 1800s and early 1900s. Church records are a valuable substitute for birth, marriage, and death records if you are searching in an earlier time period. In the county guides, such as Berks County, a great deal of effort has been made to determine which church records are available online at sites such as Ancestry, FamilySearch, and USGenWeb. Belfast, Maine's Grove Cemetery Records are now Online

Steve Boguen recently finished digitising the roughly 8,000 handwritten burial

records of Grove Cemetery where he has served as superintendent for 34 years. He started the indexing project 10 years ago.

Boguen noted that the card indexes are generally more accurate than the tombstones themselves. People sometimes were buried in family plots without an accompanying memorial. Some headstones have deteriorated or disappeared completely. In other cases, a headstone may have been placed in the cemetery "in memory of" someone who had a connection to Belfast but is not actually buried here.

The records can be viewed on the city's website at: http://cemetery.cityofbelfast.org/. The database can be searched by first name, last name or burial year and includes a map that highlights the section of the cemetery in which the person is buried.
