

Book Review

In chasing our ancestors most of us would have trawled BMD's, censuses, newspaper articles etc. with varying degrees of success. But how many of us are fortunate enough to strike gold in the form of documents? These may be wills, contracts, indentures, letters or trust depositions to name just a few. Our next challenge is to understand them. In *Understanding Documents for Genealogy and Local History* Dr Bruce Durie intends to go beyond the 'here are some documents, now you're on your own' style of presentation. He stresses that one must understand the context - be it legal, historical or social - to appreciate why a



document would be produced in such a particular manner. This is a detailed work and deals mainly with UK documents from 1560 to 1860. By the conclusion you might even be able to translate basic Latin! The work is indexed, has several glossaries while further reading is suggested at the end of each chapter.
