Index to Digitalised British and Irish Newspapers Online

This site is an index, not the images of, original records. However, every entry in the index does point to a newspaper image on one of any number of other web sites. This web site is the place to start when looking for British or Irish newspapers. The actual images of newspapers are a mix of free, by subscription, and "pay to view." There are now over 2,900 references available here

Victorian Female Prison Registers 1855-1934

Now available to view online are more than 7000 Victorian Female Prison Registers from 1855-1934 at: http://prov.vic.gov.au/

The records include a personal description of the prisoner and date of birth, native place, trade, religion etc. Some of the records also contain mug shots. Read more here

Deaths of Seamen & Other British Marine Returns of Deaths Go Online

A complete record of the deaths of Scottish seafarers from late Victorian times until 1974 is now available online through ScotlandsPeople. Among the 14,000 new records available are monthly returns of the Deaths of Seamen, which list Scots along with other crew members of all nationalities who were serving on British-registered vessels between 1897-1974. Ancestry: UK Apprentices Indentured in Merchant Navy (1824-1910)

More than 340,000 historic Merchant Navy apprentice records have been published online for the first time covering 1824 to 1910. Available via subscription or free at the QFHS library, you can learn more here

14 Volumes of Genealogical Lists of Irish-Jewish Families Presented to Dublin City

Fourteen rare volumes of genealogical lists of Irish-Jewish families in Ireland were

recently presented to Dublin City Council's Library and Archive. The volumes were gifted by Stuart Rosenblatt, President of the Genealogical Society of Ireland. He has brought together over 300 years of Jewish families residing in Ireland and enriching Irish life. At present there are over 52,000 names on his database dating from 1700. The database may be searched here Your first time is free to research, but you must register your email address and password. After that, enquiries cost €20.00

IGRS launches 'The Dublin Presbyterian Colporteur's Notebook, 1875'

The IGRS has launched a new and exciting database of scanned images from the Dublin Presbyterian Colporteur's Notebook, which dates from 1875. The rare Notebook was compiled during January to October 1875 by William Malone who travelled the streets of Dublin and jotted biographical notes on approximately 10,000 inner-city Dublin Protestants. New Storage Facility for the Australian National Archives to be the Last of its Kind Construction has begun on the National Archives of Australia's new preservation and storage facility at Mitchell. With enough shelving to stretch from Canberra to Cooma, the purpose-built repository will house around 10 million Commonwealth records when it opens in 2017. The 18,000 square-metre facility will include a conservation laboratory, digital archives for classified and unclassified records, cold storage areas and 114 kilometres of shelving. 

Millionaire Property Developer Used Children's Gravestones to Build a Patio Kim Davies took tombstones from a derelict chapel and cemented them to the walls of Llanwenarth House in Abergavenny, South Wales. Planners were horrified when they saw the 'decorative stone plaques' had been used as part of a £1M makeover to the home. The wealthy businessman also used some of the graves as flagstones for a patio which he built at the £2.2M country mansion. Details may be found here

Book Review

Joseph Buggy points out that his work, Finding your Irish Ancestors in New York City, is not intended to be a history of Irish migration to the USA. Rather it is an



overview to assist with research strategies. He states that it is particularly useful for the period beginning at the start of the 19th century through to the early 20th century. In the first section he deals with the use of fundamental sources such as censuses and vital records - some of which are underused.

Immigrants from certain counties in Ireland often settled in similar areas of New York. This can be used to advantage. The Roman Catholic Church is the focus of the latter sections. As many immigrants were of this religion the listing of every Catholic parish that ever existed (together with start dates) is invaluable. Every Catholic burial ground is listed along with other public and nondenominational grounds.

Buggy concludes the work with lists of periodicals, websites and other publications to assist research. This book crams an enormous amount of information, hints and clues in its 165 pages. Review courtesy of Pam Masel.
