As of 1st January, hundreds of records relating to Victoria's history have been made public as part of our annual opening of officially closed records. These records will be of particular interest to those of you waiting on files that mention members of your family tree.

UK Archives digitises World War I Hospital Diaries

The UK National Archives has digitised almost 250 World War I hospital diaries and put them online here-2

190,000 New records of ship passengers from England and Ireland

These passenger records span the years from 1828 to 1896. In addition to the usual information found in ship passenger records some of these new records also list additional information such as the passenger's occupation, name of employer and salary. Available by subscription here or free at the QFHS library.

Over 3.6 Million Parish Records from Norfolk Country

This release includes baptisms, banns, marriages and burial records that cover many of the parishes in Norfolk. This is the first part of a two-part release of Norfolk parish records as part of TheGenealogist's agreement with the Norfolk Record

Office. The link provides access to the complete list of parishes and dates that are covered by this release. Access is by subscription here or free at the QFHS library.

Soldiers' Wills

The National Archives of Ireland holds a collection of the wills of Irish soldiers who died while serving in the British Army. Most of these date from World War I but there is a small number from the late 19th Century and from the period of the South African War, 1899-1902. The documents have been digitised by the National Archives and are now available free online. Read more about the project here

ScotlandsPeople release another year of BMD

The latest images of Scottish births, marriages and deaths are now available. This year they consist of births registered in 1915, marriages in 1940, and deaths in 1965. The 1940 marriages are very significant because that year saw the introduction of civil marriages by registrars. Go here

African Netherdutch Reformed Church Records online

FamilySearch.org has created a new image collection of records that covers various areas of South Africa, Angola, Kenya, Namibia, Tanzania, Zambia and Zimbabwe. These records span the years from 1838 to 1991. There are some 141,000 images in this collection and consist primarily of christenings, marriages and church membership records. The records are in both Afrikaan and English and are available here



Book Review



Passage to Pusan by Louise Evans is another of those accounts which can be appreciated at two levels. This book centres on the life of Thelma Healy (neé Best) who was born in Brisbane in 1905, spent her lifetime in Brisbane and died there in 1971. Thelma's life saw marriage, multiple pregnancies, loss but overall triumph. Her family was her anchor or more correctly her children were. She dedicated her life to their well being. It is an interesting read and one can only admire her strength.

However, the book reveals diverse material on life in the period of Thelma's lifetime. The social division between Protestants and Roman Catholics is well illustrated in Thelma's case. The scandal of an out of wedlock child was bad enough but with a Roman Catholic father it simply could not be tolerated.

We can appreciate the hardship of home life in a large family with an abusive husband and father. When father Michael Healy finally opted out of their lives it was a brave step for any woman to seek upkeep via a court order. The home at 27 Miles Street Wooloowin was their haven but again this provides an insight into this area of Brisbane.

Thelma's quest to locate the grave of her precious eldest son, Vincent, opens up the field of international affairs covering World War II, the Korean War, Vietnam and the Malayan crisis.
