Treasures in the QFHS CD Collection

If you are looking for that piece of elusive Australian information that you have long been searching for, you may find it in one of the hundreds of digitised publications available on the QFHS Library's computer network. Principal among these are those digitised by *Archive Digital Books Australia* (for historical reasons, referred to as *Archive CD Books* on the computer menus). These publications, from across Australia, include Journals, Trade Directories, Pastoral Directories, Telephone Directories, Gazetteers, Almanacs, Government Gazettes, Police Gazettes, and Electoral Rolls, together with a range of History Books focussing on various Australian localities. Even random searches of these documents, when you have nothing better to do, may well provide some revealing pieces of information that help to flesh out the life of an ancestor, as they have done for me.

Particular *Archive CD Books* can be found by (a) searching v-Library, (b) searching the Master List of CDs from the Main Menu on each computer, or (c) by browsing the Menus.

Researching Women in the First World War

March marks Women's History Month, so why not discover some of the roles that women played in the war - both at home and on the battlefield? From nursing to the navy, records are available online for a range of service women, including some of the only surviving records for the Women's Army Auxiliary Corps (1917–1918) held in series WO 398. Historic Yorkshire Probate Records Are Now Online

More than three centuries worth of historic probate records have been published online, revealing the final wishes of 30,000 Yorkshire residents, dividing up everything from property to dogs and cattle and even wigs. Thousands of detailed wills, probate inventories as well as warrants and letters of administration written between 1521 and 1858 are now available offering an insight for those looking for

details of how their ancestors passed on their wealth and a snapshot of social history. The records are available here. You can read more about the new online collection here

York's Archbishops' Registers Revealed 1225-1650

Ancestry Adds the Largest Collection of Irish Catholic Parish Records Launched Online

10 million historic Catholic Parish records from Ireland have been indexed and are now available online. The Catholic Parish Registers 1655-1915 collection includes baptism, marriage, burial and confirmation records from more than 1,000 parishes, and over 3,500 registers, in Ireland. This is the first time that the collection has been indexed with the original images linked online. Ancestry.co.uk Adds the Ireland Courts Martial Files (1916-1922)

On Easter Monday, 24th April 1916, a small group of Irish Volunteers occupied the General Post Office (GPO) in Dublin and proclaimed an Irish Republic. The volunteers also secured several other key locations throughout the city including the Four Courts and City Hall. From a military perspective, the Easter Rising was a complete failure. But it was the events that followed that ensured the effects of the Rising would alter the course of Irish history. It is within this context that the Courts Martial Files play such an important role.



Book Review



Peter Fitzsimons cites the comment of American novelist E. L. Doctorow who once noted that "the historian will tell you what happened. The novelist will tell you what it felt like." Fitzsimons has strained to do both. He says that he wants the work to read like a novel but one filled with accurate detail - detail perched on some 2000 footnotes. As a young man he found it difficult to "get his head around what the whole thing was about." 100 years on many of us still struggle to make sense of the horrors of battle fields such as those of Fromelles and Pozières. The centenary has brought a deluge of works but it seems fair to say that Fitzsimons' study of this area is a high point in such writings. This 793 paged work is indexed and sourced.
